

Be it enacted, etc., That all of the lands granted to the Oregon Central Bailroad Company by an act entitled "An act granting lands to aid in the con-struction of a railroad and telegraph line from Portland to Astoria and McMian-ville, in the state of Oregon," approved May 4, 1870, chapter 69, page 94, volume 16, Statutes at Large, lying and being situated between Forest Grove and As-toria, a distante of about ninety-seven miles, be, and the same is hereby, for-feited to the United States for breach of the condition upon which the same was granted to it, the tailure to build a road from Forest Grove to Astoria, in the state of Oregon, as required by said act; and the said land is hereby declared to be a part of the public domain and sub-ject to asle and settlement under the laws of the United States. laws of the United States.




