THREE tons of salmon from Astoria passed through Portland yesterday en route to Chicago and eastern points.

THE celebrated race horse Jay Eye See made the best time on record at Providence, R. I. last Friday, trotting a mile in 2:10.

THE candidate of the Prohibition party has a good name, anyhow. The original St. John was a rigid teetotaler and extremely fond of water, but he lost his head early in the campaign of his time.

THREE millions of people have within the past sixty years emigrated from Germany, and to-day four special societies are giving their support to the colonization movement. German settlements are being formed on the west coast of Africa. Recently England has consented to the hoisting of the Imperial flag over Angra Penguena. Prince Bismarck, it would seem, is now favorable to emigration; but he is anxious, while Germans are settling in various countries, that there should be sown with them the seeds of German trade.

LOGAN'S letter has not only aroused a great deal of enthusiasm among his many martial admirers but it contains one solid chunk of philosophy which not even the immortal Tupper could convert. The soldier-statesman says: "The advantage of having a bank note in the house which will be as good in the morning as it was the night before should be appreciated by all." The senator's aphorism is worthy of a place among the maxims of the ancients. It is just such a motto that would make glad the heart of a man to whom a bank note is a burden—in his mind. If Mr. Logan had said beef, instead of bank note his maxim might have become a thing of beauty and a joy forever. But then when one has the bank note he can generally get the beef.

THE captain of the Spanish gunboat *Flamingo* has decidedly put his official foot into it. When he undertook to fire into a British sloop he probably remembered the time when Sir Francis Drake and the elements combined to sink the greatest fleet the world had ever seen. His act was a high handed one, and one which John Bull will not be slow to resent. This irate animal has already got its mane up, and the expression of its tail is warlike in the extreme. A lieutenant and two marines have laid their hardy right hands upon the Don, and he will possibly know better in future than to tackle a friendly craft. If a similar insult had been placed upon one of our own sloops our entire navy would have been ordered to keep aloft for three weeks.

FROM partially finished statistics for the season, says the *News* of the 2nd, a healthy showing of business is made, a gratifying increase in nearly all lines of produce received in Portland, over those of the previous season, being shown. The total receipts of various articles since August 1, 1883 have been as follows: 2,888,052 cents wheat, 505,823 barrels flour, 112,123 cents oats, 5,528 cents barley, 48,981 cents bran, 45,025 cents millstuff, 24,818 sacks potatoes, 43,265 bales hay, 9,473,119 pounds wool, 1,475,325 pounds hides, 30,290 boxes fruit, 41,131 barrels lime, 31,468 sacks flaxseed, and 1,818,111 pounds hops. In wool, flour, hops and wheat a large increase will be noticed over the product of the former season. This showing augurs well for a revival in all branches of business in the near future.

IF ever a chivalrous soul filled mortal clay it was that of John McGahan, the brave American journalist whose trenchant pen was the true liberator of Bulgaria from Moslem yoke; for his vivid story of the massacre at Batak made the war of liberation a necessity and gave Russia the moral backing of all Europe. Following the Russian Army, the inseparable companion of the death-defying Skobelev, laughing at fatigue, privation and accident, McGahan fell at last a victim to fever not far from Constantinople. But his daring dates farther back. He made the ride to Khiva before Burnaby was heard of. Wherever a cool head, perfect bravery and manly bearing were needed McGahan was ready to move at a moment's notice, and the brilliance of his narrative was always abreast of the brilliance of the achievement. His statue stands in Phillippopolis. His remains after a long rest in Turkish soil are on their way to his native land. In honoring them as they take their way to Ohio, American journalists will do honor to themselves as well as to their peerless brother, McGahan.

THE N. Y. *Times* of the 31st ult. had an entire page of the late history of the Union Pacific railroad the causes of Sidney Dillon's resignation and the action taken by Jay Gould and his followers. In an editorial it says: "No railroad in this country, or anywhere, ever had so interesting a history as the Union Pacific. It was projected as a national

measure, and with liberal aid from the government at a time when the country was in the throes of rebellion. It was built not merely with a view to the pecuniary profit of its individual promoters but to secure to the government at all times, but particularly in time of war, the use and benefits of the road for postal, military and other purposes. From its beginning its history has been a part of the national history. Questions relating to its management and policy have been constantly before congress, as subjects for legislation. No other road was ever so attentively studied and watched over by men in high public positions, and no other road it must be said, ever destroyed so many regulations and brought so many promising public careers to an inglorious termination. Its public history has been a promising a public scandal, from the beginning, and its inner and hidden history abounds in secrets still darker than those that have been told."
