From Astoria to Coos Bay.


A few days ago John Johnson, John Josephson, Anton Green and a \$500 \$450 \$400 \$350 large dog came from Astoria in an open boat, twenty-five feet long and six feet beam, that the men had used \$300 there in their occupation as fisher-men.
