It may be true, as estimated, that there are upward of 6,000,000 Mex-icans who can neither read nor write, know nought of a bed, and have never worn a stocking; many, too, who actually live in holes in the ground, while those who revel in the opulence of an adobe, or mud-built hut, furnish it with nought but a crucifix, an earthen jug for water and a three-legged stone on which to grind the corn for their tortillas. Even in the City of Mexico, at the entrance of their principal drive-the Paseo—you may see women in the ditches by the wayside washing out their purpor agreements and stand out their upper garments, and stand-ing stripped to the waist the mean-while, because they had nought wherewith to clothe their nakedness. There is a persistence in this old civilization that rightly directed will

work out, and is working out, great things. People are led to think of this as a land flowing with milk and honey—the garden-spot of the world—where you have only to reach out pour hand and pluck orange or banana, apricot or fig, and I know, too, that you can get excellent fruit at Cordova, for instance, and other places, but you will ride for 1,200 miles, from El Paso to the City of Mexico, without finding a great deal Mexico, without finding a great deal of this fruit. Even in the latter city there is little of it outside of bananas and oranges, and those hardly any cheaper and not as good as those you can buy in Phila-delphia, New York or Boston. As for their cantelonpes they lack all flavor, tasting much like an over-ripe pumpkin, while for a watermelon, not over twelve inches long, you will be asked \$1 in the markets of the city of Mex-

The Rise of a Bootblack.

Sir John McDonald, the present premier of Canada, is said to have started in life as a bootblack in Glasgow. He emigrated to Canada at an early age. When only 18 the daughter of a wealthy Canadian fell in love with him; and he ran away with her to a clergyman, who consented to marry them. The bride's father after a time forces this execution. ter a time, forgave this esca-pade and started him in business. Thence he drifted into politics, and displayed so much shrewdness and tact that in a short time he was a leading member of the ministerial party in the Dominion parliament. His chief opponent is the member from St. John's, Mr. Blake. In passfrom St. John's, Mr. Blake. In passing through Ottawa last week Sir John received an ovation from the inhabitants. A wooden arch spanning the street bore these words: "Welcome to the friend of Canada and the enemy of our tyrant."
