THE Chinese government has applied for 3,000 square feet of space at the New Orleans exposition.

ONE-HALF of the young ladies of Washington are said to wear presidential badges for breast-pins.

IN the White Bay district, New Foundland, it is represented that there are 3,000 persons starving.

OVER 150 small wooden portable houses for the Panama canal have been built at Quebec, and are being shipped.

SPEAKER CARLISLE made a speech at Columbus, Ohio, the other day, and went squarely back on his record by denying that he was a free trader.

SPAIN has granted France, under the most favored nation clause, the same trade privileges in the West Indies as enjoyed by the United States.

CARL SCHURZ says that if Blaine is elected he will retire from politics. Republican papers are using this as an excellent reason for voting for the Plumed Knight.

THE North Pacific mills at Walla Walla, have received orders for 15,000 barrels of flour for England. A part will be shipped to Portland at once and placed aboard.

ACCORDING to the Philadelphia Bulletin, the fashionable color from London last spring was "elephant's breath;" this fall it is a delicate pink called "whipped baby."

A SECRET society is organized in Victoria among the Chinese, whose purpose it will be to pillage from the wealthy class. Gambling is rife among them, and several serious measles have taken place.

THE Standard concedes that Ohio will go Republican next Tuesday, but thinks that anything less than 25,000 will be a "defeat" for the party. A few defeats like that would have about the same effect as a victory.

THE cholera has cost the Italian government a million and a quarter pounds. If it lasts a few months longer it will cost more than three millions, and nine to ten thousand bills have been protested in Naples.

A SYSTEM of mounted police has been organized by the stockmen of the Yellowstone, by which their interests will be protected against horse and cattle thieves and grass burners, whether whites or Indians.

LOGAN's grammar is a source of concern to several of our Democratic exchanges. The Ohio and West Virginia people, however, does not seem to have much difficulty in understanding what Black Jack has to say.

THE people of Seattle are greatly exercised over opium smuggling. Collector Bash of Port Townsend is there with a couple of assistants trying to ferret out what is now considered to be a gigantic smuggling scheme.

THE newest thing in agencies is that which promises to obtain for eminent financiers decorations or titles on moderate terms. You can become a prince for 75,000 francs, a duke for 50,000, a count for 25,000 and a baron for 20,000.

SIR EDWARD REED, a great authority on naval construction, says that the time for comparing the English naval force with the combined force of two or three of the great powers has passed and that the day is fast approaching when the question will be whether the English navy is equal to the navy of one of the great powers.

EX-GOVERNOR GEORGE PERKINS of California has been informed by ex-Governor Alas of one of the Mexican states, that the latter has succeeded in obtaining the requisite capital to establish lines of steamers to Mexico, one from Vancouver's island and Puget sound, and another from China. The principal object of both lines is to take Chinese laborers into Mexico.

IT has been determined that the first mention of the word "Democratic" in the history of our politics occurs in a letter of Edward Carrington, supervisor of Virginia, dated February, 1794, in which he reports the formation in Bourbon and adjoining counties of Kentucky, of "the Democratic Society for the purpose of preventing the collection of the tax on whisky."

ONE thing ought to result from the general publication of the facts of the Blaine affair—namely, a public determination that the laws of marriage shall be so revised and unified throughout the country that no citi-

zen of any state need ever be in any doubt whether he is lawfully married or not, and no woman or child shall be—as hundreds in many states now are—unable to know what his or her legal status is. Where more acknowledgment, without license, ceremony, or registration, is accepted as sufficient to legalize marriage, families that have grown up in full belief of their own legitimacy under an open, formal and recorded marriage are liable to be summarily dispossessed of name and estate by the offspring of some anterior secret and informal relation. The possibility of such moral and legal outrages—to say nothing of the dismal anxieties when well-meaning but phenomenally ignorant persons may suffer when they have placed themselves in positions like that described by Mr. Blaine—should persuade the law-makers of the country to at once sweep away all recognition of irregular and unrecorded marriages, and require that contracts upon which the legitimacy of children, the lawful status of women, and the inheritance of estates may depend, shall be entered into only after due public notice, and be promptly registered in the public records.

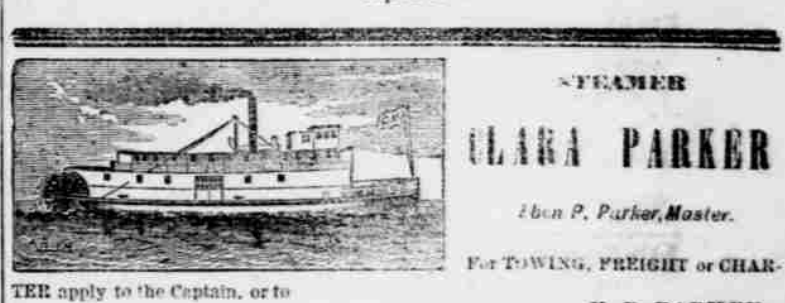
