FROM ALBANY TO NEW YORK.

New York, October 15,-Governo Cleveland left Albany this morning, accompanied by his private secretary and Mayor Banks of Albany. It was the expressed wish of the governor that no demonstration be made along the route. At Poughkeepsie, how ever, there was a crowd so large and enthusiastic, that he was induced to show himself to the assemblage. For five minutes he shook hands with all who could reach him. At this point Senator and Mrs. Newbold boarded the train and the governor chatted pleasantly with Mr. Newbold until Garrison's was reached. Here Hamilton Fish got on board the train and entered the ear occupied by the governor. They greeted each other cordially and conversed together until the arrival of the trrin at the Grand Central depot.

At about 10:30 a committee, composed of Senator Barnum, chairman;

Abram Hewitt, Senator Gorman of Maryland, ex-Mayor Grace, Senator Gwinn, J. W. James, C. D. Campbell, H. B. Lighter, J. B. Coleman, Eugene Kelley and Messrs. Greene and Van-derpool, met the governor at the depot and after an exchange of greeting escorted him to the carriage, which he entered in company with Senator Barnum and Colonel Lamont. Large crowds had assembled at the depot and when Governor Cleveland made his appearance cheers were given. which were continued until the carriages departed. Large numbers of men rushed toward the governor and held out their hands, which he smil-ingly grasped. Several times after the carriage had started the driver was ordered to stop his horses, so the governor could satisfy the desires of those who wished to shake his hand.

The party drove to the Fifth Avenue hotel, where the governor alighted. Here he attracted a large crowd, and was lifted up and carried some distance by enthusiastic supporters, and was followed by a cheering crowd until he reached the street. He immediately proceeded to his rooms. Quite a crowd gathered out-

side the hotel and gave hearty cheers On the arrival of the Democratic candidate the rooms of the governor were immediately besieged by poli-ticians and reporters, who were anxious to get a word from him or his secretary, but Cleveland remained in private, to which only a select few could gain access.


