When urged to burn, or in some other way dispose of their sawdust, lumbermen have objected that they could not afford the cost. There is hope that the perplexing problem of dealing with this nuisance may now be solved, for a process has been dis-covered by which the refuse sawdust may be made to yield a handsome profit. When dry it is carbonized in iron retorts, and, in the process, there is given off eighty per cent, of volatile products, the other twenty per cent-being granulated charcoal which can e used in making gunpowder, filters, lining refrigerators, and as a disin-sectant, and mixed with a little tar it could be pressed into bricks and used for fuel; twenty-two of the eighty per cent. of the volatile product is in the form of fixed gases which can be used for heating, lighting, etc.; forty-seven per cent. is pyroligneous acid, which is crude acetic acid, and after being purified and concentrated, is used in white lead, color, paint and vinegar manufactories. The sawdust from yellow pine and other wood rich in resin yields also a considerable amount of turpentine, in the gathering of which so many trees are every year sacrificed. It is estimated that in sawing inch boards of pine, hem-lock, etc., the one-fourth saw-kerf uses up one-fifth of the log. When lumber is sawed by the billion feet, one can easily see that the question of disposing of the sawdust in a way to yield a profit instead of a first class nuisance, is a very important one. The se-geant will guard the private one day, the private will stand sentinel over the post hos-pital the next to prevent its escape, and every third day the whole force will turn out to watch the actions of the Indian agent.


