THE N. Y. Times and the World announce that Blaine Republicans, despairing of success in New York, have resolved to abandon the state to the Democracy and apply the money which was to be expended there to an attempt to win New Jersey, Connecticut and Indiana.

THE Paris Patrie says it is probable, in the event of the failure of the active overtures of England in the direction of mediation between France and China, that reinforcements of 20,000 troops will be sent to China, with a view to occupying Canton.

A SPECIAL from Indianapolis says: Colonel New, chairman of the state central committee, says the Republicans will carry Indiana. He bases his opinion on two careful canvasses—one made in July and the other about three weeks ago. Still another canvass is now making, and will be mainly for the correction of the second one. He says the Democrats have no hope of carrying the state. They are striving to carry the legislature, and re-elect Senator Voorhees.

A LONDON cablegram says: In France things continue to look awkward for the men in power. There is no alternative, in spite of all Jules Ferry's dexterity, between abandoning operations against China and largely increasing the force there and raising further taxation. Everybody in Paris yesterday had his ear to the keyhole of the committee rooms in which the Chinese credits were being discussed, but the promise of secrecy has been well kept for once, and all the reporters were able to announce that the friends of the government looked depressed, that Ferry evidently was out of sorts, and that Clemenceau complained of a nervous headache.

THE Wall Street News of the 27th says: "Much wild talk is being indulged in on the street regarding the effect of the opening of the Oregon Short Line to its Portland connection on the 20th of November. It is claimed that in connection with the Oregon Railway and Navigation it will boycott the Central Pacific on San Francisco and tributary business." The News adds, sarcastically: "We have no doubt in the world that the bulk of the trade will be moved over that wildcat road. Shippers to San Francisco will feel perfectly safe about their goods, knowing that they will be handled only three extra times and that the route is as straight as a dog's hind leg."

THE N. Y. Star, Tammany's organ says: We are informed the Democrats in Ohio are reorganizing for a big fight in November, and profess in face of the 12,000 Republican majority to be able to win back the state. Drop it like a hot brick. New York is the key to the situation, so far as Democratic hopes are concerned, and to carry it for Cleveland every pound of push in the party must be concentrated behind him. Bring in here your speakers and your money; get hold of the bellows of enthusiasm and heat every iron as hot as you can, for you'll need every one of them. This state was never so doubtful at this stage of a presidential canvass, and every vote will be needed to pull the ticket through.

In the course of an editorial, the N. Y. Tribune of the 27th, says of Beecher: "Does he think he honors himself by the insincere pretense that his free trade fanaticism does not control his action in this presidential contest, or impel him to judge the letters of others as he long ago begged the Christian world not to judge his own letters? Does he think he honors his church by his teachings that its pastor can be uncharitable and abusive in the treatment of public men, and as reckless and untruthful in a statement as any pagan? Does he think he honors his own long-suffering wife by publishing the disgusting drivel addressed to her by a man of debased character, who crawls under her pure mantle of shelter?"

SOME remarkable statistics are published in connection with the sales of land on the Union Pacific Line. For example, in June last the sales reached 453,299 acres, at the aggregate price of \$931,041. In June, 1893, the sales were only 118,547 acres, and the amount \$485,660. The land sales on the main line for the half-year ending June 30, 1894, amounted to 2,062,291 acres, of the value of \$4,127,411; while the sales for the six months ending June 30, 1890, were only 255,965 acres, of the value of \$1,056,328. The land sales on the Kansas-Pacific division for the six months ending June 30, 1894, amounted to 206,391 acres, of the value of \$976,547, and for the six months ending June 30, 1893, the sales amounted to 161,251 acres, of the value of \$683,043. Taking the two divisions together, there was an increase in the sales for the first half of 1894 of 1,821,456 acres, of the value of \$3,960,556. Or, to take another view, Union Pacific land sales receipts in the six months to June, 1894, exceeded by \$2,243,073, or about 79 per cent, the total receipts for the first halves of the years 1891, 1892 and 1893. This new and extensive demand for land is due to the

fact that the tide of settlers is turning from the northwest into the warmer regions of Nebraska and Kansas. It is expected that at the present rate the tide will soon cover the whole of the 15,000,000 acre grant of the Union Pacific.

A LOUISVILLE, Ky., dispatch of the 27th, says: Hendricks was greeted by 10,000 people at New Albany, Indiana, to-night. In his speech he discussed the tariff, arguing that duties should be levied only for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the government. He said Cleveland received support from the best elements of the Republican party, including ministers, scientists, college professors, students, editors and laborers. He emphasizes the fact that the Democrats look for strong support from the independent Republicans. In closing he eulogized the Democratic party, saying it espoused the cause of the weak against the strong, of the poor against the rich, of the oppressed against the oppressor. The speech was frequently interrupted by applause. Governor Hendricks was followed by General Manson and others, who delivered brief encouraging addresses.

A LONDON special says, regarding the Egyptian situation, that the situation is deplorable. The city of Cairo especially is becoming debauched by the sudden plethora of money caused by the preparations for the Nile expedition. Money is pouring into the country, not only from England, but also from speculative people of all nationalities, and an enormous bill will have to be footed and paid by England some day. The officers, both civil and military, are careless and wasteful. The bill of Cook's tourist agency for coal and transportation was \$250,000 during the first two months after the Nile expedition was decided upon, and is probably twice as large now. Scores of British officers are lounging about Shepherd's hotel, in Cairo, awaiting orders and incurring bills which run as high as \$300 a week. The soldiers of the Guard regiments and members of the Camel corps, before they started south, were taken to see the pyramids and the sphinx. It was a gigantic pleasure trip, and the cost to England will doubtless be as pyramidal as was the picnic.

"Our of evil cometh good," and all the crimination and reprimand of the past four months, the speeches, the newspaper articles, the hundreds of thousands of political pamphlets have the effect of enlightening and educating and explaining, so that nearly every man in the United States that votes next Tuesday will have a clear idea of what he is voting for and why. The result will be in the fullest sense "the will of the majority." Whatever the outcome on the 4th of next month it is to be accepted as the intent of the voters, for there is hardly a nook or corner of the Union that has not had explained the whys and the wherefores of the political fight. The reasons why the Democrats should win, the reasons why the Republicans should win, have been elaborately stated in a dozen different ways and nothing but aggravated carelessness will have caused any voter to ignorantly cast his ballot next Tuesday. The cost of all this runs up in the millions, but it is not money thrown away. On the contrary it is well spent. It is the price that the nation pays every four years for political education.

THE Philadelphia Press of the 27th contained a careful canvass of the majorities which will probably be cast in the most important counties of New York November 4, and dispatches from the chief points of interest in the state. The figures are revised by the Republican leaders who have had long and successful experience in the politics of the state. Their footing displayed a majority of 26,510 for Blaine. The dispatches pointed to heavy Republican gains in members of congress, and also gave renewed evidence of the generally accepted fact that the alleged independent vote is confined to New York city and Brooklyn, and in those cities is offset by the Democratic disaffection. A review of the situation, telegraphed by the editor of the Press from New York city, announced that the Republican leaders have sincere and undoubted conviction that they will carry the state. Representative and thoroughly informed men from different sections are positive that there are no anti-Blaine Republicans of any serious account. The threatened prohibition vote is speedily declining, and will not be a formidable factor, and the losses from Cleveland, either to Butler or Blaine, will largely exceed the losses from Blaine.
