In 1874 the National party polled 16,233 votes, while the Democrats polled 182,154 and the Republicans 164,902. This was a state election, but it gave the first idea of the power of the third party. In the presidential year of 1876 the National vote was reduced to 9,538 and the two great parties ran almost neck and neck—the Democrats scoring 213,526 and the Republicans 208,111. The state election two years after, in 1878 showed the extraordinary national vote of 39,451 on secre-tary of state. The Garfield election cut this down to 12,986, and it was only raised to 13,520 in the state elec-tion in 1882. These figures, however, show the importance of the Green-back party in a state which has given an average plurality in six elections, since 1872, of not


