FACTS AND NEWS.

German immigrants avoid the cotton states.
Twelve steel rolls are used in making a \$5 bank-note plate.
The area covered by the capital in Washington is 153,112 feet.
The largest United States bond issued is the \$50,000 registered bond.
The round trip expenses of an Atlantic steamer run from \$46,000 to \$70,000.
The largest silver certificate printed is \$1,000. Four are printed on a sheet.
We have eight thousand sailors, no armored ship, and no guns of any account.
New Mexico has 3,000,000 sheep and 2,000,000 cattle on its 77,500,000 acres of land.
As much as \$5,000,000 have been shipped from the United States treasury in a single day.
A number of St. Louis capitalists are about to establish a Catholic colony in Texas.
Six hundred and seven females are employed in the bureau of engraving and printing.
It is estimated that when the Washington monument is completed its total cost will be \$1,120,000.
There are 14,000,000 cattle in this republic, one to every three men, women and children.
There are more than 513,000 volumes in the congressional library, besides about 170,000 pamphlets.
Sixteen persons have died in Vermont during the past three years who were reported to be over 100 years old.
A silver star marks the spot in the Baltimore and Potomac railroad depot where Garfield fell when shot down by Guiteau.
A California fruit-grower has succeeded in growing fruit-stone peaches so large that but 15 can be packed in a 25-pound box.
A farmer in Ohio county, Ky., has tobacco measuring 43 inches from the stalk to the tip of the leaf and 30 inches in width.
A 13-year-old girl, who is perfect in other ways, but has simply little blue spots where her eyes should be, is said to be living at Amherst, Wis.
Since the development of the Saskatchewan coal fields by the extension of the Canadian Pacific railway, coal in Winnipeg has been reduced to three years from \$24 to \$7.50 per ton.
One of the largest orange trees in Florida (if not the biggest) is in a grove near Tampa. The trunk is six feet three inches in circumference, and the tree bears from 10,000 to 12,000 oranges every season.
The little books of rice paper that cigarette smokers use for the manufacture of homeopathic smokes are handy things for people who wear spectacles. The paper is said to be the best thing in the world to wipe the lenses with.
Illinois, it is said, still leads all other states in miles of railroads, having 12,882 miles. Ohio is second, with 9,000 miles; New York third, with 7,230 miles; Pennsylvania fourth, Indiana fifth, Missouri sixth, Wisconsin seventh, Texas eight, Minnesota ninth.

Murder at a Dancing Party.
NEW YORK, OCT. 31.—A special to the World from Macon, Ga., says: The recent murder of E. A. Odorn by John Cheek, in Emanuel county, proves to be one of atrocious features. Three years ago, John Cheek, with his wife and four children, arrived in Emanuel county in a destitute condition. So hopeless were they of their future that they were about to be placed in the poor-house, when Odorn, a well-to-do farmer, took them into his own house and harbored them for months free of charge, until the husband and father was able to care for his family and himself. This act of kindness Cheek always represented himself unable to pay. Two weeks ago a party was given, at which Odorn and Cheek with their wives were present. After awhile the free use of liquor gave evidence of coming trouble. John Cheek was lying upon a sofa when Odorn came in and the two began talking of old times, Cheek referred to the debt of gratitude which he owed Odorn and said he could never repay him. Odorn replied that he could always get along well enough with men, but sometimes he found old women were a little troublesome, insinuating that Cheek's wife was a liar. Cheek replied that he had the same opinion of Odorn's, and added: "My friend, what you have said stung me." He then jumped up, pulled out a revolver and fired two shots. Then rushing through the company he made his escape. Odorn fell dead in the arms of one of the dancers. In the excitement consequent the murderer escaped. Dogs were placed upon his track the next day, and after scouring the country for miles around a trail was struck, which led to his capture in Laurens county. It was with the utmost difficulty that the officers saved him from being lynched.

The Model Wife.

Scripture and history and poetry vie with one another in sounding the praises of the model wife. The man who is blessed with a companion worthy the name of a model wife can snap his fingers in the faces of all the old bachelors that ever breathed and give them points each day in every exalted pleasure that makes life worth living. There is no danger of his applying for a divorce.
Unfortunately for the married men of the generation, the model wives are most all dead. The struggle for existence was too much for them. The ceaseless, silent self-sacrifice needed to build up a model domestic character could only be met and borne as long as there was a living appreciation of the personal laws of duty that underlie all sorts of ideal existence. The men who appreciated model wives and were in return willing to be model husbands, were so few that the good wives—that is, the model wives—grew discouraged and took to their graves or some more congenial occupation.
The few model wives that are left are cherished by their husbands beyond even their cigars or their horses. The model wife of the workingman, clerk, or business man has some appreciation of the ten thousand little labors, petty cares and annoyances that her husband has to go through each day in his workshop or office. She considers that such worrying cares are a part of the duties by which her husband makes a living for himself, for her and for the children, if there are any. And when the husband comes home from his work, tired, perhaps cross and hungry and out of sorts, she is always ready to meet him with some quiet and gentle good cheer. Her own person is attractive and restful to him. She always has some scheme in mind to make his home hours delightful to him, and so make herself indispensable and a constant joy. The model wife does not see how many poor and silly or exacting things she can say to her tired husband. If she has anything to ask she waits until he is rested and fed. She invites pleasant people to her home, not to show how many rich friends she has, but to make her husband's home hours pass cheerfully. She knows that if she is half a woman no other can displace her in her husband's affections. She is always more attractive in her manners than to other men. She is the genius of the household. But, unfortunately, most of them are dead.
Explain the Mystery.

VICTORIA, B. C., Nov. 1.—A mysterious affair is being investigated at New Westminster. On Wednesday three Hydus Indians were found in possession of a Columbia river fishing boat. It is quite new, and the masts have not been strained in heavy gales. They are branded with a red hot iron, and each of the three bears the letters "J. N. Y.", in two places. The boat is copper fastened, and worth \$200. The Indians said they bought it from a sailor for \$50. When asked from what port they sailed, one answered, "Come down Fraser river." They are in prison, and will be examined on Monday. In the boat the constable found a chart of Haro straits and a chest of carpenter's tools. The letters "P. J. S." are carved on one of the plans with a knife. All the tools are marked H. P. C. In a portmanteau there is a lot of underclothing, quite new, a fine linen shirt and a suit of clothes for a boy. In an old pocketbook were discovered, with the aid of a microscope, the following entries: "Homestead application 5681. Worked for W. S. Slade one month." On another page appears this entry: "J. M. Breen, Esq.; Albert Sangtry (or Langtry) Tacoma; bought a cow of G. Elder Breen and Deitrich." In another page, in the same hand, appears: "Quit herding Chinaman on Seabird bluff, March 8, 1883." There was a fiddle in the boat. Seabird bluff is on the Fraser, and railway officials will know who it was that quit herding the Chinese. An album fresh from the store contains the picture of an Indian, his wife and child, and the miniature likeness of a young white man, who was aged about 25 when the picture was taken.
