POLITICAL POINTS.

STILL CLAIMED BY THE TRIBUNE.
NEW YORK, Nov. 9. - The Tribune is the only paper which this morning questions Cleveland's election by over 1,000 plurality. The Tribune says: "The official count of the vote of this state is required to decide the result on the presidency. The vote is close, and while the outlook is still hopeful for Blaine, the plurality either way will be small. Some slight changes in the figures have been reported from several counties, and the vote in New York city varies considerably on different counts made. In Brooklyn the Democratic vote is being reduced, on account of errors. In Albany friends are charged with having not counted the loss of 388 votes. There are also disputes in other counties, as to the accuracy of the figures heretofore reported."

MEETING OF DEMOCRATIC LAWYERS.
NEW YORK, Nov. 9. - About fifty prominent Democratic lawyers met to-night and discussed the law relating to boards of county canvassers in the various counties throughout the state. The result of the discussion is that Democratic lawyers will be present at the meeting of every board of canvassers Tuesday next, for the purpose of taking prompt action in case any illegal act is attempted on the part of the canvassers.

DEMOCRATIC PROCESSION ATTACKED.
CAMDEN, N. Y., Nov. 9. - While a Democratic procession was marching through the Seventh ward, and when in the negro quarter, it was attacked with brick and stones by a party of enraged colored men and boys. The assailants were finally driven off. A number of persons were seriously injured.

MEETINGS HELD ALL OVER THE UNION.
NEW YORK, Nov. 9. - From all parts of the country come reports of meetings held last night, which the Democratic national committee called through the associated press. In speeches and resolutions all are in line with the meeting at New York. Illuminations were general in the south.

A DEMOCRATIC MEETING.
NEW YORK, Nov. 9. - At the Democratic meeting last night Senator Bayard said further: "We demand that the hundreds of millions accumulated in the United States treasury, against which there is no claim, shall be immediately let loose, and take its wonted place in the channels of manufacture and commerce. I say deliberately that any wrong that shall take from the American people the fruits of the great victory which they have achieved will be resisted in every proper and legitimate way." United States Senator Gordon of Georgia said that for the first time in a quarter of a century he "could greet his hearers as his fellow-countrymen. For the first time since the hostile guns of the north and south ceased to thunder I feel that I am equal in our common country. I stand before you to-night and salute your flag as my own. The same blood courses through your veins as mine. We love liberty, we love good government, and by the God of the fathers, we intend to stand by you in the future for it. To you this triumph is a new north; to the south it is a resurrection."

Resolutions were adopted congratulating the business men of the country on the election of Cleveland and Hendricks, and expressing the opinion that the nation was now assured of four years of pure government by a capable and honest man.

A Chicago Sensation.
CHICAGO, Nov. 9. - The Daily News, an anti-Blaine paper, publishes the following astounding statements from Cleveland's manager, admitting that he had been holding back election returns: It is announced that Dan Manning has laid his trump card on the table. In all the returns thus far published the plurality in Albany county for Cleveland has been stated as 648, showing a great Democratic loss over 1880, when it gave Hancock a plurality of 3,993. Mr. Manning has been holding back returns from that county, and now announces that Cleveland's plurality is 3,648, giving Governor Cleveland the state by about 4,000 plurality. Manning's object in thus holding back Albany county was, it is stated, to put the Republican managers on record.

A Desperate Mania.

John Anderson, who lived with his brother about six miles back from Carroll's point, W. Va., became a raving maniac last Tuesday night, and he and his brother - both bachelors - being alone, the lunatic locked the door and made a desperate assault upon his brother, who only by severe exertions saved himself from death. He received some severe injuries and was unable to get away until about four o'clock in the morning, when he burst open the door and rushed out into the darkness, with one boot on and the other in his hand. A lamp, which was hurried after him by his crazy brother, came very near knocking him down. He gave the alarm and the neighbors went and secured him and brought him to Kalama, where he was confined in jail over Wednesday night. Thursday morning he appeared all right and Sheriff Smith took him down town, where he was calm until after noon, when at an unexpected moment he made an assault upon the sheriff, but as help was near he did not succeed in injuring more than swelling his jaw. The lunatic imagines he is the Lord, and said the reason he assailed his brother and the sheriff was that they would not believe, but that he made them believe. Dr. Moore, of St. Helens, came down Friday and made an examination and pronounced him hopelessly insane, and he was taken to the lunatic asylum at Steilacoom Friday night. - Standard, 8th.

The Sun's Heat.
One acre of the sun's heat supplies energy sufficient to run all the steam engines on the earth. Is the radiation of the sun a constant quantity? This is a most difficult question. The vine and the olive flourish as they did two thousand years ago. From geology we can gather no certain evidence. But we must apply to the sun these principles we have enunciated. Some have said that the constant rushing of meteoric bodies into the sun feed it and keep up its heat. We can calculate this matter, and let us see how much would be required. If you should take the moon, and crumble it up, and pour it into the sun, it would not keep up its heat for a twelve-month. No, this cannot be. Then, is the sun a red-hot body gradually cooling? No. Then is it burning out, consuming itself. In such a case, it would have all been burned out by this time. Humboldt discovered the clew to this problem. The sun is gradually growing smaller, four miles in a century. As the particles grow smaller, they crowd closer together. And here in this delicate relation we find a solution of this question. I may seem to state a paradox when I say that while the sun is losing heat it is growing hotter. As the sun shrinks it parts with heat, but if the sun is gaseous, the quantity left grows hotter and hotter. This cannot go on forever. It is doubtless true that the sun is more brilliant now than it was ages ago, but when the sun shrinks so as to become mostly solid, this brilliancy will cease to increase, and the heat will eventually cool. As the sun is decreasing in size, so once it must in ages ago have been a hundred times larger than at present, and far back enough have been a diffused object, a mass of nebulous matter.

Alaska Seal Fisheries.
The seal fisheries in the northwestern part of Alaska are controlled by the Alaska Commercial Company. The contract stipulates that not more than 100,000 seals a year shall be killed, for which the company pays the territory an annual fee of \$35,000, besides \$2 for each skin shipped from the territory, and 50 cents a gallon for seal oil; also that the company shall annually furnish free to the inhabitants 25,000 dried salmon, 60 cords of wood, a sufficient quantity of salt, and to maintain such public schools as are needed. All others are prohibited from killing in Alaska any other, mink, martin, sable, or seal. Every summer trading schooners, as they are styled, go out with the avowed purpose of meeting the whaling fleet and bring in the sperm oil. They return with large barrels, which are entered at the Ounakal custom house as "oil," and immediately sent to San Francisco. The captain of the man-of-war stationed at Sitka, speaking of the matter said: "I would just like to overhaul one or two of those vessels and find out whether the oil contained in those barrels runs out or spreads flat, and has hair on one side." - S. P. Chronicle.
