follows: Sec. L—If any person or persons shall carry any basket or baskets, buckshall carry any basket or baskets, buck-et or buckets, bag or bags or any other thing suspended from or attached to poles across or upon the shoulders, or shall carry any rubbish, garbage, swill or fifth seas to be offensive to reacher; of hot less than ave dollars, or by im-than one hundred dollars, or by im-prisonment of not less than one or more than twenty days, in the city jail. Sec. 2.—If any person shall remove, transfer, or transport through any of the public streets of the city of Astoria the public streets of the city of Astoria any swill or garbage, except it be in a tightly covered box or apparatus, or in such a manner as will prevent the contents thereof from being deposited in the public street, or from being exposed in the open air during such process of transportation shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than five nor more than one hundred dollars or by imprisonment in the city isid not less

more than one hundred dollars or by imprisonment in the city jail not less than one nor more than twenty days.

Sec. 3.—If any person or persons shall cut, saw, or split any wood on the sidewalk of any improved street within the city, shall upon conviction thereof be fined not less than two or more than one hundred dollars, or by imprisonment in the city jail until such fine and costs of action are paid, not exceeding twenty days.

action are paid, not exceeding twenty days.

Sec. 4.—Any person who shall post, stick, stamp, paint or otherwise affix or cause to be done by another any notice, placard, bill, poster or advertisement to or upon any side walk, crosswalk, curb or curbstone, lamppost, hydrant, shade-tree or tree, or upon any gate, gate-post, awning, awning-post, horse post, telegraph or telephone poles, or shall post, stick, stamp or otherwise affix or cause to be done by another, any notice, placard, bill, poster or advertisement upon any building wall or part thereof without first obtaining permission of the owner, agent or occupant of such premises, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined not less than two or more than one hundred dollars or by imprisonment in the jail of said city until such fine and costs of action are paid, not to exceed twenty days.

Sec. 5.—In case of conviction of any of the offenses mentioned in this ordinance, the court shall adjudge the offender to pay the costs of prosecution, and shall in default of payment of fine and costs, commit the offender to the city jail for a term of imprisonment not exceeding twenty days, and in all cases where the term of punishment in the

jail for a term of imprisonment not exceeding twenty days, and in all cases where the term of punishment in the city jail in lieu of a fine shall not be fixed by the Police Judge the offender shall be imprisoned in default of payment of fine one day for each two dolars of such fine; provided that in no case the term of imprisonment shall exceed a period of twenty days.

Sec. 6.—It shall be the duty of the Chief of Police and the police force to see that the provisions of this ordinance are enforced.

This is, any one may take up 160 acres of land, valuable chiefly for stone, on the same terms as tim-ber lands, at a minimum price of \$2.50 per acre. It does not apply to lands containing gold, silver copper, quick-silver, coal, etc., and refers to land unfit for cultivation and chiefly valuable for timber and stone.

When any one applies to purchase a tract for the stone contained on it, under the act referred to, he must make affidavit of citizenship or intention of becoming such. He must also make a sworn statement setting forth that the land is uninhabited, is unfit for cultivation, is chiefly valuable for timber or coal, contains no mining improvements, or deposits of gold, copper, silver, coal, etc.; that it is not bought for speculation, but in good faith for use, and that he has made no agreement to dispose of it to

Then he must publish the required notice, and have an affidavit of the publisher of the paper in which the notice was published. Two disinterested witnesses must swear to the non-mineral character of the land. This testimony must all be taken before the register and receiver, and if no adverse claim is filed, the appli cant will be allowed the entry and get his receipt for the purchase money. The register or receiver is entitled to a fee of \$5, and 22% cents per hundred words for testimony reduced by them in writing for the claimants In case of an association of persons making application for such an en-try, each of the persons must prove requisite qualifications, and each name must appear. They must also unite in the regular application for entry, which will be made in their joint names, as in other cases of joint cash entry.

Sec. 3.—No person or persons shall break through or attempt to break through such blockade or run over any line of bors at a first

ine of hose at a fire. Sec. 4.—All steam engines and other movable apparatus of the fire department shall have the paramount right of way through all streets and thoroughfares of the city of Astoria when going to a fire and such apparatus, together with all other vehicles contiguous thereto, excepting street cars, shall take and keep the right side of the street, unless the same be obstructed, and all street cars in the vicinity of such apparatus going to a fire shall retard or accelerate their spend as occasion, may require in

going to a fire shall retard or accelerate their speed as occasion may require, in order to give the apparatus of the fire department the unobstructed use of the street for the time being.

Sec. 5.—No person or persons having the control of any vehicle shall wilfully or carelessly permit the same to obstruct the progress of the apparatus of the fire department while going to a fire.

Sec. 6.—Any person who shall violate any of the foregoing provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof before the police judge be fined not less than five dollars nor more than one hundred dollars or by imprisonment in the city jail not more than 20 days, or by both, as the police judge may determine.

by both, as the police judge may determine.

Sec. 7.—The Chief Engineer of the fire department, assistant engineers, clerk of the department, and Chief of police and police officers and fire police, are directed to see that the provisions of this ordinance are enforced, and make complaint in the police court for the violation of the provisions thereof.
