THE PRESIDENT ELECT.

How Grover Cleveland Carries His New Honors.

NEW YORK, Nov. 16.—The Sun's special from Albany says: President-elect Cleveland manifested no more active interest in the result of the official canvass to-day than during any of the days it has been in progress. He occasionally asked his private secretary how the count in New York was progressing, but such inquiries were rather incidental than otherwise, and on being assured that the governor lapsed into his customary state of apparent indifference. It is certain that the governor, all through the exciting campaign, remained steadfast in the conviction that he was to be successful. It is reported that just before the election, when asked by an intimate friend upon what he based his conviction, he replied: "Oh, I don't know; but it's just my luck." That seems to correctly express it.

For some reason the number of visitors to the executive chamber since the election has been remarkably small. It is true there has been no lack of sight-seers, who have literally taken possession of the chamber, gazed in wonder at the magnificent carved oak ceiling, fingered the pictures and even fondled articles on the governor's desk, but there have been no notable.

THREATS AND PETITIONS.
The governor's mail, however, has been simply enormous. During the campaign it was large, but has increased four-fold since the election. Several clerks have been constantly employed in opening, assorting and answering letters. While many of the missives are couched in congratulatory terms, others are those of warning, and others still are dire threats. Several writers solemnly swear that Cleveland shall not live to see another fortnight; others warn him to beware of plots against his life, and advise him to ride instead of walk to the capitol, and have at least four guards at the entrance to the executive chamber.

Probably Cleveland has seen none of these missives, but if he has it is safe to say they do not worry him in any great extent. He is in splendid health, and seems to be at peace with himself and the world. Not even the trying ordeal of the past two weeks has in the least disturbed his serenity.

A very large number of letters contain applications for office, the positions desired ranging from county postmasterships to cabinet positions. Several thousand of these have already been filed.

The gifts that have been received by the governor in the last four months would go far toward stocking a country store, and are almost infinite in variety.

THE DEFEATED CANDIDATE.

He Gossips by Telegraph with Friends in New York.

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—At the Republican national committee room yesterday afternoon Chairman Jones, Mr. Elkins, Secretary Fessenden, ex-Senator Henderson of St. Louis, and a number of politicians met and discussed the result of the canvass in the city and state. A telegraph operator, with a small box relay resting on the table before him, connected the committee room with Mr. Blaine's private library at Augusta, and the gossip of the day was speedily transmitted to the latter. The clicking of the instrument was accompanied by varying smiles on the face of the operator, as he turned off page after page of pleasant retorts and sallies from the Maine statesman.

"Mr. Fessenden has just come in," telegraphed Mr. Elkins, as the secretary came in from an adjoining apartment.

"How do you do Samuel?" wrote the operator over the signature of "J. G. B."

"Never better," replied the secretary, and then began a general talk with the gentleman in Augusta.

A COMMITTEE'S OPINION.
"How does Mr. Blaine take things?" queried your correspondent, of a prominent member of the committee.

"Like a duck takes to water," was the reply. "His courage is insurmountable. He looks things right straight in the face, and never flinches. I know something about Mr. Blaine. I served in congress with him, and saw him go through the investigation of 1876, which was the greatest event in Mr. Blaine's entire career. I sat in my seat in the house when he raised his hand above his head and said: 'I appeal to 50,000,000 of my countrymen,' and I tell you I thought his finger would reach to the dome of the capitol. Judge Thurman told me afterward that it was the greatest event he ever saw in the house of congress, and a Democrat who sat near Mr. Blaine when he stepped down the aisle, told me lately that if Blaine had advanced another foot he believed he would have sunk under his desk. No one in the sound of his voice dared to question his integrity or doubt his innocence."

NOT OUT OF POLITICS.
"I do not think," said an Augusta friend of Mr. Blaine's, "that he will take it so much to heart as many think he will, because he is a trained politician, and is ready to accept the fortunes of war. Do I think he will retire from politics? No, I don't think he will. His splendid leadership in the late canvass has given him a strong hold upon the affections of his party, and they will not permit him to be relegated to private life. If there was a chance to-day to send him to the United States senate from Maine, I believe the Republicans of his state would put him there, but there is no opening until two years hence, when we will choose a successor to Senator Hale.

In the matter of powder making, Pennsylvania leads all other states in the Union, with New York and Ohio competing for second place. Curiously enough much more powder is burned in time of peace than in time of war. The average daily consumption of powder in the United States is 100 tons. In a battle in which 50,000 men fired forty rounds each, less than one-quarter of an ordinary day's quota of powder would be used. In the construction of the Hoosac tunnel more powder was exploded than in the war of the rebellion, and a single large coal mine will use almost as much. The coal trade consumes more powder than any other single interest. A quantity is exported, and the rest is used in civil engineering, in the manufacture of pyrotechnics, for sporting and military purposes, and by the government in firing signals and salutes.
