LITTLE BITS OF PHILOSOPHY.
Things That are More Easily Preached Than Practiced.

TRANQUILITY.
Probably nothing tires one so much as feeling hurried. When, in the early morning, the day's affairs press upon one's attention beforehand, and here come the wonder how in the world everything is to be accomplished - when every interruption is received impatiently and the clock is watched in distress as its moments flit past - then the mind tires the body. We are wrong to drive ourselves with whip and spur in this way. Each of us is promised strength for the day, and we must not wear ourselves out. If only we can keep cool and calm we shall be less wearied when we have reached the eventide. The children may be fractious, the servants trying, the friend we love may fail to visit us, the letter we expect may not arrive; but if we can preserve our tranquility of soul and demeanor we shall get through everything creditably.

OUR INFIRMITIES.

A REPUBLICAN'S VIEWS.
A Member of the National Committee Talks About Blaine and His Defeat.

CHICAGO, Nov. 18. - The following interview with J. S. Clarkson, member of the national Republican committee, was published in the *Daily News* to-day: "The dinner at Delmonico's lost votes for Blaine, but the national committee was not responsible for that. Field issued an invitation, and Blaine accepted it. Then came Burchard with his miserable alliteration, that cost Blaine 10,000 votes. The whole thing was deliberately planned by Burchard's three sons, who supported Cleveland. The speech must have been prepared in advance. No man thinks of alliterations when making extemporaneous remarks. Burchard was there, but it was not intended that he should speak, but some one thrust him forward, as the oldest preacher in New York, and then he spoke his piece. Another thing that injured us," continued Clarkson, "was Arthur's indifference. He certainly did not exert himself in the campaign, nor did his warm friends. Had the New York postoffice been closed on election day, 1,800 carriers could have voted, and the state would have thus been saved for Blaine."
"How do you account for the large independent desertion?"
"The independent Republicans did not support Cleveland on account of opposition to Blaine. It was solely on account of their free trade ideas. When George William Curtis left Chicago, after the convention he no doubt intended to support Blaine. I was in the caucus with him to discuss the question of nominating a candidate for vice president. Before we voted he left the room, because he said he did not wish to be bound by the caucus, but he said nothing about opposing Blaine. It was not until he got back to New York, and found that the proprietors of his paper had determined to go against Blaine, on account of free trade, that he concluded to oppose him."

BLAINE'S FUTURE.
"What will Blaine's future be? Will he run for congress, as has been suggested?"
"No; he will devote himself to his literary work, as he desired to do before the convention. He did not want to be the candidate for president this year."
"Will Conkling be made senator?"
Arthur hopes that, through Blaine's defeat, he may come forward in 1885, but that hope will not be realized."
"What do you hear of Cleveland's policy?"
"I spent four days in Virginia after election. Three-fourths of the Democrats there expect to be reimbursed for their loss during the war. The south comprises four-fifths of the Democratic party, and according to the ordinary rules of arithmetic four-fifths can control one-fifth. The south will control the caucuses of the party, and shape its policy. When was there a Democrat who was not controlled by the south? Now, here are these independents. They claim to be Republicans, but they are now demanding representation in Cleveland's cabinet."
"Do you think that 30,000 independents, or 5,000,000 Democrats will control Cleveland?"
"His administration will be dictated by the south."

New York, November 14. - The *New York Tribune* says: About 25,000 (nearly all Republican) votes were cast for St. John in this state. The Republicans, however, gained from other quarters about 3,000 more votes over Garfield's vote than they lost by the diversion to St. John, or by the transfer of the bolting free-traders to Cleveland. In New Jersey the vote for Blaine is 2,800 more than the vote cast for Garfield, yet there were about 6,000 votes diverted to the prohibition ticket. Assuming that 5,000 former Republicans voted for Cleveland, as the bolters claimed, the Republicans must have gained nearly 14,000 votes from former Democrats, or from new voters. A similar state of facts appears in other northern states. The Republican party has gained more votes than it has lost.
