This teaches pedagogues that they cannot be too impartial. Had the unfortunate young man smiled on the thin girl in the arithmetic class he might have been whipped by six irate maidens and quarreled, thus involuntarily making himself a practical example of addition, division and silence.

The musicians and instrument makers of Germany are petitioning Prince Bismarck to establish a normal musical pitch. The discord of the past presidential campaign in this country has been so inharmonious that similar steps should be taken here. Let our wise statesmen prepare a proper political pitch, so that when the keynote of a campaign is sounded the music will be one sweet strain of celestial melody. We have had too much of "sweet bells jangled."

An apparently trifling, but in reality a very important suit, has been brought by an obstinate citizen of Frankfort-on-Main against the municipality. He sues for the recovery of 1 mark 80 pfennige (forty-five cents United States currency), on the plea that the city has not furnished him the proper quantity and quality of water stipulated by contract. Plaintiff does not consider himself bound to fulfill his obligation if the city does not comply with its own, and hence has brought this test case, which is being anxiously watched by his fellow citizens.

Learn the nomination of Horace Greeley for the presidency in 1872, Whitelaw Reid, Mr. Albert of Baltimore and a number of other gentlemen had a dinner. One bottle of wine was left after all had been satisfied and it was agreed to place on it an inscription to the effect that it was not to be drunk until after the election of a Democratic president. All present affixed their signatures to the agreement, and Mr. Albert has religiously preserved the bottle ever since, and now has it in his possession with the signatures still legible. As a Democratic president has been elected, and as no arrangement was made as to who should drink the wine, Mr. Albert will send it to President-elect Cleveland with an explanatory letter.

The London Economist states that the tremendous drop in the price of wheat has produced something like a panic among the wheat growers of the country. When they had to sell at a quarter they declared they could only do so at a loss and now that good red wheat is selling in the country markets at 30s, they are talking about giving up wheat growing altogether. What will farmers do? They certainly cannot keep on growing wheat to sell at 40s a quarter; and if they were sure that such a price would prevail next year, there

would probably be a greatly diminished area sown with this cereal. It is doubtful whether English farmers can profitably grow wheat at 40s a quarter, and we may be certain that if the average price should be permanently below that figure, the area of land under wheat will in future decrease even more rapidly than it has done during the last ten years. In no country will farmers keep on growing wheat at a loss. Even the ryots of India cannot send us wheat at 20s a quarter, and may be concluded that no other country can; therefore, the present low prices will not last long.
