SPECIAL COUNCIL MEETING.

Recommendations of the Committee on Rules and Regulations. The city council met in special session yesterday afternoon for the purpose of taking into consideration the advisability of change in the charter, and getting the ideas of the council relative thereto.

The council went into a committee of the whole, and the following report on bodies the conclusions arrived at: The Hon. Mayor and Common Council of the City of Astoria:

We, your committee report that we have examined the present city charter and find it defective in several respects. We recommend that the powers of the council be extended in regard to opening laying out and widening the streets of the city.

We also recommend that the charter be so amended (if necessary) as to allow the collection by the harbor master of harbor dues from a vessel arriving or lying in the harbor.

We also recommend that the outgoing mayor present the annual address instead of the mayor's report.

We also call the attention of the Hon. Mayor and Common Council to the advisability of doing away with the office of city assessor and taking a transcript of the county assessment roll of city property as the city assessment roll.

We also recommend that the charter be so amended (if in the judgment of the city attorney the same be necessary) that the council shall be empowered to make any necessary repairs to the property of the city and charge the same to the property owners.

That all new streets hereafter opened planked or macadamized shall be done at the expense of the adjacent property owner and that hereafter the same be kept in repair by general taxation.

STATE AND TERRITORIAL NEWS.

Tacoma has a sidewalk three miles long. There are 33 newspapers in Washington territory. Eight hundred tons of wheat are daily shipped from Walla Walla.

The total vote of Washington territory at the late election was divided between the eastern and western sections as follows: Eastern Washington, 13,321; western Washington, 22,212.

The Indian training school at Forest Grove has 13 children from the different tribes of the Pacific coast. One hundred and three boys and eighty three girls.

The Olympia Transcript says: "The Sitkop railway company have now three miles of their track ready for the iron, and all lands will be made to put on the rolling stock. The road so far graded extends from Shetland's Point in the westerly direction, and will eventually connect with the Pacific and Gray's Harbor."

Hope baled and shipped to the amount of \$250,000 pounds was the amount of hay baled and shipped in Yakima valley in the season of 1914.
