### EASTERN OREGON WEATHER.

Yesterday afternoon was the first time since the 15th inst. when the wind did not blow a gale between Hood River and Rooster Rock. Should the same favorable conditions exist to-day, we may expect to hear of some good progress by the force of snow shovels. Most of them have been resting and, being able to get enough food and warm places to sleep, the work ought to go vigorously. But the removal of the snow is almost an appalling work. In the first place it is packed hard by constant winds. They, about half way through, it is nearly solid ice, and the result of one day's thaw followed by a sudden freeze. For a great part of the distance the snow and ice have to be loosened with picks and then shoveled out. The first crowd of shovellers sent from this city are above Rooster Rock tunnel and made nearly a mile yesterday. The second crowd are about three miles this side and made about the same distance. Yesterday afternoon a third crowd of 110 started from East Portland and are expected to overtake the second crowd some time this afternoon. They took along a large supply of provisions. The first crowd, above the tunnel, have enough provisions with them to last until Monday night or Tuesday morning. Snow plows will not be able to do very much between Rooster Rock and Viento, a distance of thirty miles.

The snow plow from the Dalles reached a point a short distance above Hood River, and returned to The Dalles last night. Should the weather be calm to-day, it is expected that the plow will reach the imprisoned passengers to-night or to-morrow.

The O. R. & N. officials have strong hopes, provided there is no renewal of the storm, to have the track clear by Tuesday night or Wednesday morning.

H. B. Borthwick, the well-known logger and mill man of the Upper Cascades, W. T., walked in from the Cascade locks, arriving last night. He has resided along the middle Columbia for several years, and has means of comparing the snowfall during this storm with that of previous years. About the heaviest snow since 1861 was four years ago, when the Columbia river was closed for nearly three weeks. The depth then was not one-third of the present depth, and none of the old-timers can remember themselves, or recall others telling of any storm which in any way approaches this for severity or for amount of snowfall.

Nor was the snowfall less on the Washington territory side. When Mr. Borthwick last fell his mill on Thursday, the 18th instant it was five feet deep on a level. The wind blew straight down the river for days and days without intermission and there was no cross current from the Washington shore which so often prevails in summer, particularly at Wind mountain. From the amount of snow which he saw on the track below the locks, and the hardness with which it is packed, to say nothing of ice formations, Mr. Borthwick is of the opinion that 1,000 men could not clear the road in a week.

The several falls along the line of the road present at this time a strikingly handsome appearance. The Horsetail fall, near Onocenta, is one unbroken, graceful curve of ice until within about thirty feet of the base, where the water, hitherto hidden under the ice, bursts into spray and falls upon a mound of solid crystal ice fully twenty feet high.—Oregonian, 27.

**Walla Walla, Dec. 25.**—Still no mail from the west and the snow here and the Pacific Dalles is very deep. Northern Pacific trains run on time. There was a small mail to-day from the east, but there has been none from Oregon or California for twelve days. Two engines could hardly bring the train into the station here to-day.

### THE BLESSING OF UNREST.

It was in mid-ocean, on a winter's passage across the Atlantic eastward, a storm was raging. The great steamer rolled and pitched by turns. Her beams cracked, her mighty frame quivered with the convulsive struggles of her engines and the sea. At the dead of night her passengers were in their stateroom berths, many of them restless and longing for rest. Suddenly there was silence and rest, unlooked for. The engine stood still. The cracking and quivering had ceased. The great steamer no longer pitched or rolled. And in an instant those passengers whose chiefest longings had been for rest, started up in their berths more disturbed than by all the disturbing restlessness which had preceded this repose. Best! at such a time, and in such a place, as this! Best! when wind and waves are at battle, and a ceasing to struggle seems a yielding of hope! Best! Is this the rest of death? Only in the trough of the sea, and with the engines and the rudder useless, can there be such rest as this? Oh! for the old unrest, against which tired nature rebelled! There was terror and a new longing in that rest. And when, after a little season for the repairs of the steamer's shattered bow, the old quiver came again to the mighty frame, the engines rumbled and clanked as before, the beams cracked with their accustomed strain, and the mammoth vessel pitched and rolled and tossed in the renewed struggle with the opposing elements, many a passenger who had stood or lain with bated breath, in that period of unwonted rest, thanked God for the restored unrest, with a new sense of its often unnoted blessedness.

It is not alone upon the sea, in a winter's storm, at the dead hour of night, that there is a blessedness in unrest, even while the whole soul is longing for rest. Wherever there is need for a struggle, or a desire for progress, or a hope of difficult attainment—passive rest is the shadow of death, and unrest is the symbol and evidence of abounding life. Only through present unrest, can abiding rest be attained. Only through the experience of unrest, can abiding rest be found a blessing.

In the dying song of Moses, the Lord is represented as lovingly forbidding passive rest to his chosen son Israel; so shaking him out from his place of satisfied repose, in order to his restless activities in the needed struggles of life and progress: "As an eagle stirreth up her nest fluttering over her young, spreadeth abroad her wings; so the Lord alone did lead him." In Favor of the Nicaragua Treaty.

**NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 26.**—The *Piety*, in a double-leaded leader, speaking of American policy and the Nicaragua treaty, says: "The country is ripe for an entirely new departure—one worthy of our great nation and one that will stamp itself upon the whole history of North America. We must adopt a policy of acquisition and territorial aggrandizement to the southward. It need not be accomplished by armed invasion or inaugurated in blood. The Nicaragua treaty is the entering wedge. Let us drive that home, and by investing \$100,000,000 in a ship canal there secure the country. American enterprise will soon annex the whole of Central America from that base line. Sectional discord is happily ceased, and the south is primarily and deeply interested in turning the tendency of enterprise and the march of empire southward and her statesmen, by at once championing a bold and brilliant policy in that direction, will open up a new era for the entire country, and map out a safe and short road to prosperity and continued national growth. The issue is tranquility at home, and add to the glory of our great republic."
