AROUND THE CITY.

NEARLY NEW YEAR.
The old year went out with a howl. Latest telegraphic news on fourth page.
Good skating is reported at Ft. Stevens.
There will be skating at the rink to-night.
Al. Holman is a passenger on the incoming steamer.
C. Leinenweber started for the state capital yesterday morning.
The snow is ten feet deep between Tillamook and McMinnville.
The Oregon is due from San Francisco to-day. The Queen sails to-morrow.
The Astorian will appear as usual to-morrow morning. It's a cold day when we get left.

The thermometer was twenty-two degrees below zero at The Dalles last Tuesday morning.
Lost, strayed or stolen—the warm Japanese current: a liberal reward will be paid for its return to this community.
There was a merry time at the Germania hotel last evening and every one enjoyed themselves to the utmost.
Workmen began taking out the remains of the *Chesapeake* yesterday. It is thought that it can be done under the circumstances.

Owing to the inclemency of the weather last evening the falls for the splendid mirror from Carl Adams's Crystal Palace was postponed till further notice.
As the hands of the clock pointed to twelve last night the ringing of bells, the firing of guns and the blowing of horns announced the birth of a New Year.

The firm of Bergman & Berry has been dissolved. Mr. Bergman having purchased Mr. Berry's interest in that long established and prosperous business.

At the stockholders meeting of the Fishermen's Packing Company held Dec. 29, the following were elected directors: C. Timmins, H. F. Bruhn, A. Heister, Gust Haines and A. Young.

From San Francisco the steamer ending with "Oregon" has shipped 20,000 bushels of wheat and 10,000 bushels of barley, an aggregate of 30,000 bushels of grain.
Several citizens improved the opportunity yesterday by strapping on skates and went scooting along the sidewalks with the greatest of ease. Others tried it with roller skates on and sat suddenly down.
A drizzling rain fell yesterday, freezing as it touched the snow and covering the sidewalks with a slippery glaze that made all progress painful. Business was almost entirely suspended, and the last day of '84 was the most uncomfortable of the winter.

The committee of citizens chosen by the chamber of commerce to make suggestions concerning the proposed revision of the city charter, met yesterday afternoon and were subdivided into special committees who are subdivided so as to take up each topic and make a report, the reports to be made on to-morrow afternoon.

There is a section regarding the duties of the police judge that gives him the power to fine a convicted prisoner \$100, but the next limit of imprisonment in his jurisdiction is twenty days. State prisoners usually serve a sentence, in default of payment, at the rate of \$3 a day, but a sentence in the police court would be served out at the rate of \$5 a day. Suggestions have been so plenty of late that this comes in with so good grace as some of the others.
