THE STATE LEGISLATURE.

HOUSE. SALEM, January 14. The house was called to order at 12 M. Speaker Keady in the chair. After roll call Rev. Mr. Hill of Salem offered prayer.

In the afternoon but little was done beyond the introduction of bills. Fifty-two altogether were introduced to-day.

The senatorial question is being discussed quietly. The Republican members, with anti-monopoly predilections, are opposed to any caucus, and it will be hard to persuade them to accept the decision of the senate only to prevent.

The Venes correspondent comments as follows: It must be conceded, the Democrats have shown much sagacity in the organization of the legislature. Keady was elected speaker of the house by Democratic sagacity, while Waldo became president of the senate only to prevent a Democratic success.

The Oregonian says: The Democrats are going to dictate much of the legislation, simply because there are some Republicans who are willing to do their bidding provided they can defeat certain Republicans. To-day R. P. Boise stands a fair show for the senatorship, and will be elected unless there is a radical change.

The Oregonian's correspondent comments as follows: The most noticeable feature of to-day was the organization of standing committees of the senate. The arrangement, as reported by the special committee, composed of Davenport, Allen, Cartwright, Myers and Bilyea, was accepted by the senate without alteration.

BOILED DOWN.

J. P. Jones was re-elected to the United States senate by the Nevada legislature last Wednesday.

The secretary of the national Republican committee thinks St. John offered to sell out to the Republicans last October.

In the French chamber of deputies last Wednesday, Ferry declared it to be the intention of France to occupy Tonquin, completely closing up the Chinese frontier.

A Washington special says it is by no means certain that President Arthur will be allowed to sign the bill to put General Grant on the retired list, as general of the army.

The London Daily Telegraph of the 11th, states that Germany has acceded to England's proposal, that neither power shall annex the Samoan islands. This agreement puts an end to the scheme of the British colonists in New Zealand to annex the islands.

Trade with the west coast of Mexico is made available to American manufacturers from February 1, by a contract signed on the 15th in the city of Mexico, by the attorney of the American, the Mexican and Santa Fe railroad and the minister of the interior.

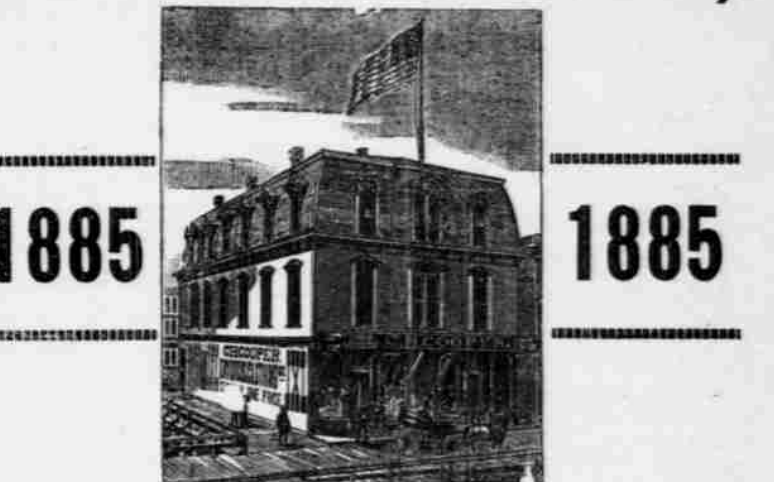
