THE NEW YORK PRESS.
NEW YORK, Jan. 26.—The Herald, referring to the dynamite explosion, says: "We propose, so far as Americans are concerned, that the dynamite business shall be brought to a speedy end. We propose to turn on it the broad daylight of decent public opinion in America. We will place the London police in possession of important facts which our correspondents have been able to glean in Paris. Indignation over the Westminster outrage is all but universal in this city." The Herald has opinions of representative men of all professions and trades. With equal unanimity eastern newspapers of all political creeds denounce the outrages as dastardly.
The Tribune calls for concerted action on the part of civilized nations for mutual protection against enemies who may be justly designated foes of the human race.
The Times says: "Edmunds' bill is the beginning of an attempt in good faith to legislate against preparations here for such crimes as the London explosions, but does not entirely meet the difficulty. The point to be met is, that America constitutes a refuge for Irish dynamites, where they find recruits for their work and get funds which sustain them. These are not random statements." The Times calls for the suppression of "mutant papers which it denominated 'mutant prints'."
The Star favors Bayard's resolution, but doubts the practicability of Edmunds' bill. It says: "Who expects to see anybody convicted in the United States courts of intent to commit murder with dynamite or intent to aid in the destruction of human life by supplying explosives?"
MAN SHOT IN WASHINGTON COUNTY.
HILLSBORO, Jan. 26.—A probably fatal shooting occurred this morning about 9 o'clock at Glencoe. It seems that William Johnson, of Glencoe, better known as "Grizzly Bill," and James Smith, better known as Lang, met at the postoffice in Glencoe and commenced talking very pleasantly. They mounted their horses and rode out across the bridge on the road to Portland. When opposite Mr. Goodin's, two men, some 150 yards behind, saw Smith draw a revolver and fire twice. Johnson's horse sprang to one side and threw him off. Smith then fired twice more at Johnson, when he jumped off his horse and took to the woods. It was found that Johnson had been hit in the left side, just above the point of the hip, the ball passing clear through the body. A physician was sent for, and a sheriff's posse are on the trail of Smith, the mountains yet being covered with snow. The assailant is the same Smith that "killed" a man in Columbia county years ago, and later came near killing Flem Dobbins. Nothing is known of the cause leading to the shooting.
SALLEM, Jan. 26.—Mrs. F. G. Schwatka, mother of Lieut. Fred Schwatka of Arctic fame, died suddenly in this city this morning.
At Forest Grove, on the 26th, in an altercation over some property, Lang Smith shot and killed William Johnson, known as English Johnson. They were brothers-in-law.
