Malice and conscious inferiority have a keen scent for blemishes.

During the last year 320,800 steerage passengers and 59,500 cabin passengers landed in New York city.

At Sacramento yesterday, Ex-Gov. Stanford, the California railroad king, was elected U.S. Senator for six years from March 4th, 1885, to succeed Jas. T. Farley. The vote was a strictly party one.

The Cincinnati distilleries have raised the price of whisky to \$1.13 a gallon, "on account of the high price of corn." Corn has advanced from 25 cents to 6 cents a bushel (its price in Nebraska) since September, and one bushel of corn will make three gallons of whisky.

WASHINGTON TERRITORY's exhibition at New Orleans has been badly managed. Our enterprising sister made handsome provision in every way for suitable representation, but some way the whole thing is a failure. "A plank and a stump" is said to constitute the principal part of the display.

The point of view determines mostly what a man will do. Cowardice asks, "Is it safe?" Expediency asks, "Is it politic?" Vanity asks, "Is it popular?" Conscience asks, "Is it right?" Whatever is uppermost in the man's disposition will influence his actions, whatever the nature of the case may be.

The Nautical Gazette says that nine-tenths of all strandings and collisions of vessels at sea occur in the second mate's watch, and it concludes that a very large proportion of officers of that grade are incompetent or unreliable. The remedy suggested is that second mates should be examined and licensed just as their superior officers are.

In Sussex, Kings county, N. B., the overseers of the poor dispose of their paupers by auction. Four aged paupers were put up at auction the other day to be knocked down to the lowest bidder, that is, the man who would undertake to keep them at the least cost to the overseers. One man went at \$90 per annum, and an old woman went at \$72. There was some competition over the third, the bids offered being \$71, \$70, \$65.50, and finally the old man was knocked down at \$64.50. A fourth pauper was put up, but did not attract a single bid. "And this was in a Christian land."

Is France no candidate for the legislature is elected unless at the first ballot he has obtained an absolute majority of the votes given, and a number equal to 25 per cent. of the electors on the register. If these conditions are not fulfilled, a second election takes place on the second Sunday following the day of the first return. At this election the candidate who stands highest at the poll is declared to be successful, no matter what proportion his votes may bear to the total number of voters. A peculiarity of the French electoral law is that, if an equal number of votes is recorded for two candidates, the elder of the two is declared to be elected.

One of the oldest and shrewdest cannerymen on the river makes a suggestion that is not new, but is certainly a very sensible one. In effect it is that the cannerymen of Astoria and vicinity unite in paying the expenses of a resident agent in Liverpool whose sole business shall be to attend to salmon sales and business connected with Columbia river salmon interests in England. It would appear as though the business of one or two, or three cannerymen would well-nigh justify the one, or two, or three cannerymen having some one to guard their interests, but it is manifest that the whole lower river could find more than enough for a competent man to do across the sea. All the reclamations, the deficits, the dribblings, big and little, that so sadly reduce the probability of slight profit flourish under the present system. The actual presence of a man in the interests of the manufacturers would seem to be absolutely necessary to attain results in the English market half way satisfactory to the Columbia river manufacturers.

A BILL has been introduced into the California legislature which will be regarded by fishermen and others interested in the fisheries of the state with some interest. It provides that every person engaged in the vocation of fishing in the state shall first take out a state license in order to get the privilege of using a net or boat. The state comptroller is empowered to prepare suitable licenses

and metal contrivances, to be attached to the fishing boat to notify every one that the owner of the boat has paid his tax. The annual license is fixed at \$5 for each boat worked by less than three men and \$2.50 for each man employed in excess of three. The fish commissioners are empowered to collect the license or to employ some one to do it for them, and authority is given the commissioners to arrest any person found fishing with a net without a license. The money derived from this tax is to be paid into the treasury to constitute a fish commission fund, and shall be used to propagate, introduce into and restore fish to the waters of the state. REPRESENTATIVE OATES of the committee on public lands has prepared a report on the bill to prevent aliens and foreigners from acquiring or owning lands within the United States, which the committee has referred to the house with the recommendation that it pass. Oates says: "Your committee has ascertained with reasonable certainty, that certain noblemen of Europe, principally Englishmen, have acquired and now own in the aggregate about 21,000,000 acres of land in the United States. We have not sufficient information to state the quantity owned by 'untitled' aliens, nor is it so important, as it is generally held in smaller bodies. This alien, non-resident ownership will, in the course of time, lead to a system of landlordism incompatible with the best interests and free institutions of the United States. The foundation for such a system is being laid broadly in the western states and territories. A considerable number of immigrants are annually arriving in this country who are to become tenants and herdsmen on the vast possessions of these foreign lords, under contracts made and entered into before they sail for our shores."
