PRESIDENT-ELECT CLEVELAND is learning to dance.

TWELVE thousand invitations will be sent out for the presidential inauguration ball.

AMONG the Arabs the belief is prevalent that washing the face is simply an indirect form of suicide.

GOV. SQUIRE of Washington territory, in his report to the secretary of the interior, urges strongly the right and necessity of that territory's admission as a state.

A PROPERTY-OWNER in Campbell county, Ga., is said to have recently walked a distance of one hundred miles to pay a tax of four cents on a lot of "wild land."

THE forty-eighth congress closes on the 4th of next month. Like all congressional sessions just after a presidential election all business has been controlled by politics.

A DEMOCRAT in Plymouth, N. H., has a barrel of cider made in 1860, which he has said should not be tapped until there shall be a Democratic president. His friends will sample it on the 4th of March.

HINSCU is gradually gaining. Yesterday's dispatches indicate that if he get seven votes more to-morrow he will be in the direct line of election; twenty-seven votes would be a majority of the Republican members.

ON account of the want of interest thus far in the New Orleans exposition, it is suggested that Ben Butler be sent there, and after receiving the freedom of the city and a gold snuff-box, be placed on exhibition as a presidential curiosity.

THE remains of workmen who died and were buried along the line of the Northern Pacific railway while it was building are now being exhumed, placed in coffins and buried in a finely laid out cemetery at Missoula, M. T., at the railway company's expense.

A NEWSPAPER correspondent at New Orleans writes that at one of the hotels, a rear room, four flights up, is invoiced at \$3.50 per day, a life-preserving breakfast for \$1.50, a dinner of moderate proportions \$2.50. And yet it was announced that the hotels would not advance their rates.

NEW YORK dudes wear colored shirts and cuffs with white collars, and it is said that the fashion began with British nobleship. The Prince of Wales wore that kind of rig one day because his baggage miscarried and he had no other, and the nobility and gentry promptly and innocently followed suit.

THE London Army and Navy Gazette, commenting upon the outbreak in Corea, refers to two strong reasons which Russia has for desiring to extend southward her frontier to Corea, and urges England and America, which both have large interests in Corea, to join with Japan in an endeavor to frustrate the designs of Russia.

JOHN R. McLEAN runs the Cincinnati Inquirer. This is his idea of journalism: "My business is to buy white paper at the lowest market price and manufacture it into an article that will sell for five cents per sheet. If I make what the people want, they buy and my profit is great. If I don't make what they want I get left. Well, I don't get left—that's all."

SHEWED observers believe that the ultimatum of Bismarck's policy is the demolition of the British Empire with a division of the spoils, which would give to Russia, India; to France, Egypt and Hongkong, and to Germany, South Africa. There are others who see only a strategic plan to pit the various powers against each other, and prevent combinations which might menace Germany.

THE San Francisco newspapers contain long accounts of the infamous traffic going on there of selling white babies to Chinese. It is shown that the business is mainly carried on through the agency of private establishments termed "lying-in hospitals and homes for foundlings." The matrons of these places charge \$50, if the mother desires to keep the baby, but only from \$20 to \$30 if the mother gives up all claim to it. In the latter case it becomes the property of the matron, who sells the baby over again to whoever she can find that will pay the most for it. In this way many of these unfortunates have been sold to the Chinese. The latter pay more for female babies than male ones. The Evening Post, referring to the iniquitous practice of white

mothers selling their illegitimate offspring to the Chinese says: "We are informed, upon the very best authority, that these children are purchased in many cases by Chinese speculators, and sent to China, where they are raised until they are twelve years of age, and then sold to wealthy Chinamen for large sums of money, to be placed by them in their harems. One of the most dreadful phases of slave-trading is going on in our midst, and if strong measures are not taken to stop it at once it will be a disgrace to our city and our civilization."

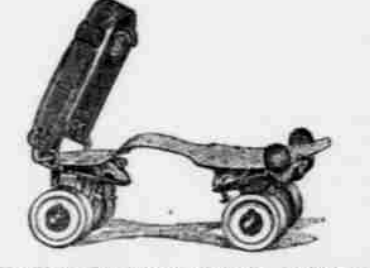
