FARM LIFE FOR YOUNG MEN.

There is no occupation so grand, so noble, and that which makes one so independent as farming. It gives you an opportunity for mental strength during the winter, and physical strength during the summer. It is a home where good morals can be entertained without those allurements which are always predominant in city life. He who tills the soil is engaged in an honorable occupation. Agriculture is the greatest among the arts, for it is not in supplying our necessities; it favors and strengthens population; it creates and maintains manufactures; gives employment to navigation and materials to commerce. It is also the strongest bond of internal peace, the natural associate of good morals. So the young man who desires to leave the farm and go out into the wide world for himself, perhaps to some far off city, or some spot on his native land, where he imagines there will be a paradise open for him; such a step in life should be well considered before taken. It is a good thing to fit yourself for a lawyer, a doctor, a minister, but it is a better thing to know that you can be one. Young men, favored with every opportunity for enjoyment at home, and not overworked, imagine that they can do better than to guide the ox, or to turn the stubborn glebe. And, with the mere trifles of consideration, the hands are withdrawn from the implements of agriculture and given to the office or the shop work of the city. And thus thousands of young men are utterly ruined. If they would only stop and think, "What can I make of myself?" The question, "To what is my ability most adapted?" Then they might go forward into life's journey with a better prospect of success. "Ever remember," writes Goldsmith, "that for health and substantial wealth, for rare opportunities, for self-improvement, for long life and real independence farming is the best business in the world."

VALUE OF SMALL THINGS.

The *Husbandman* of E. Mira, N. Y., teaches a lesson in brief when it says: "A grain of wheat is small, when considered by itself insignificant. It is but the merest fraction of appreciable value, yet it is typical of the interest that engages attention from a nearly half our people—the farming interest. To get this grain of wheat the farmer must have fitted the soil, sown the seed, cared for the crop to the harvest, gathered it, threshed it, and all these operations have filled the year. His rewards are fairly typified by the insignificant kernel of wheat that must be multiplied a thousand fold before it has practical utility in feeding his family or supporting commerce and giving him that full return for labor which is his just due. The lesson to be derived from the grain of wheat has deep import for farmers who find profit and loss separated by but the narrowest margin. The little things must be put to use and from them must be obtained the fullest value if profit is to be realized. Failing in this regard, loss is almost certain. The farmer deals every day of his life in small things, but in the aggregate these little things make the commerce of the world. He produces food for all mankind and the fiber from which their raiment is wrought. His mission is of first importance, and although it relates almost wholly to small things, if he be not faithful to them and watchful to make the most of his opportunities, distress falls, not only upon him and his family, but upon the world. He must multiply the grain of wheat indefinitely, and he must care for the increase judiciously and constantly or fail of his rewards."

STATE STATISTICS.

A condensation of the report of the secretary of state shows the total value of taxable property in 1884 was \$73,306,953, an increase of over \$11,000,000 over 1883. The tax was \$411,145.19 for 1884. The value of land was \$35,293,036, of town lots \$13,875,008, of improvements \$10,430,045, of merchandise \$13,122,048, household furniture, etc. \$2,841,031. The number of horses and mules was 131,146, value \$5,361,736; cattle 284,947, value \$5,215,851; sheep 1,083,978, value \$2,248,870; swine 123,841, value \$293,985. Gross value of all property \$108,648,286, indebtedness \$27,177,631, exemption \$5,463,118. The number of polls was 19,720, number of school children 69,676, wealth per capita \$621.62. Douglas county has the largest number of acres of improved land, 504,396, but Linn county leads as to value, \$5,131,520, Marion second, Yamhill third. Multnomah heads the list on town lots, \$7,274,915, with Marion second and Linn third. On merchandise all so Multnomah heads the list, Marion second, Clatsop third, Linn fourth. In money also Multnomah is first, Marion second, Yamhill third, Multnomah next and Linn fifth. Union county has 17,441 horses, followed by Grant second, Wasco third and then Yamhill, Baker and Crook in their order. Grant leads in the number of cattle, 74,611, followed by Baker, Crook, Lake, Union, Lane and Wasco. Yamhill is the sheep county, with 249,951, Wasco, Grant, Douglas and Crook after it. Jackson has 13,235 hogs, Douglas comes second, Lane third. Under the last assessment Multnomah pays the largest tax, Linn next and then Yamhill, Marion, Lane and Yamhill.

Disappointed Legislators.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—The star-chamber policy of the house committee on rivers and harbors has incensed a great many members. The usual privilege of going before the committee to be heard on their districts was this year entirely withheld. This naturally aroused a good deal of resentment. The only way for congressmen to be heard on the improvement is to take the bill by the horns in the house and push amendments there to increase needed appropriations. This course will be pursued by a number of western members who feel dissatisfied. It is said also that the rule laid down by the committee to allow only twenty-five cents of every dollar asked has not been lived up to, especially the appropriations asked for.

NEW YORK, Feb. 1.—The committee having in charge the raising of funds for the Bartoldi pedestal, being confident that congress will pass the bill appropriating \$100,000 for that work, are no longer pushing for funds in other directions. The original estimate of cost for the pedestal was \$250,000. About \$160,000 has been raised by popular subscription, and with the congressional appropriation and what is yet to come from the state and local committees, there will be an ample sum to meet all expenses.

When the vine dies in the fall remove it to the ground. The next year the same roots will send up the same garlands.
