Providing for a bond of \$1,000, one provision being against keeping open on Sunday. Penalty \$50 to \$200. 4th. That any person wishing to sell liquor must obtain the signatures to a petition therefor of an actual majority of the legal voters of the precinct where the liquor is to be sold, according to the last preceding general election, the number to be greater than that of any renonstrance. 
