THE NEHALEM COUNTRY.

Good Dairyland and Stock Raising Region
NEHALEM, Feb. 13, 1885.
Ed. News:
This is the lowest settlement on the Nehalem river and has about 130 persons exclusive of Indians, of whom there are but a few left. We have two postoffices, Nehalem and Onion Peak. Considerable mail matter finds its way to the Nehalem office in error, owing to senders failing to state the county. Forest Grove people can make a note of this, as most of it comes from their section. Presuming that this part has been described, I will simply say that this is the only settlement on the Nehalem river in Tillamook county. The people are engaged principally in dairying and stockraising on a small scale. Our chief drawback is having to ship our produce to and bring our supplies from Tillamook bay, this river bar being as yet unsurveyed. It has been ordered, and last fall Major Eastwick was in and made a preliminary examination, and when he left stated that in February (the present month) he would bring the steamer *Lincoln* into Tillamook bay, watch his opportunity, run up here and survey the bar and river. Naturally we are very anxious to know if he is going to do so, being sadly in need of market facilities. We would not care a snap for a steamer if the Astorians would build the proposed coast railroad. Old hunters here, men thoroughly familiar with the country, say there would be no difficulty as regards passes, etc., the most feasible route being from the Seaside up the Nekanehin river valley across the Onion peak coal beds, through Foley valley and the Tillamook settlement, thence through the Grande Ronde valley to Forest Grove. We have some of the finest cedar, fir and spruce timber in the world, easy of access, and men of means ready to build mills as soon as there is a way to get the lumber out. There are some good homesteads yet to be found here. Alder, cottonwood and vine-maple bottoms, and some brush bottoms nearly clear of big trees. Like all the Nehalem country, game and fish abound, and here, near the mouth of the river, ducks and geese are numerous in the season. Quite a number of newcomers settled here last season, and doubtless a few more will find their way here from the great influx of immigrants Oregon will receive next year.

SEA PIE.

SALEM, Feb. 23.—Governor Moody is of the opinion that the legislature is not legally adjourned, owing to informality, and that the members, if they choose to do so, could meet in legal assembly to-morrow. This opens up several interesting questions. Has the governor a right to appoint a senator while the legislature is legally in session? The constitution provides that all laws in which a time is not fixed for their coming into effect shall become law of the land ninety days after adjournment. The question is, if the legislature is not adjourned when bills adopted go into effect? These questions open a wide field for speculation, and little else has been talked about at the state house to-day. It is suggested that in this emergency the governor declare the session at an end, but there is neither authority nor precedent for this.

NEW YORK, Feb. 23.

The new mortgage will also include six million 7 per cent. debenture bonds, issued last year to build the line to Huntington, connecting with the Oregon Short Line.

A SHOCKING FAILURE.

LONDON, Feb. 23.—One of the most singular incidents ever connected with an execution or attempted execution for murder happened to-day at Exeter, on the occasion of carrying out the death sentence passed upon John Lee, recently condemned to be hanged for the murder of Miss Emma W. Kives, at Babacombs, near Torquay, November 14th, last. Three attempts were made to execute Lee, but each attempt was futile, the drop failing to work successfully. The execution was consequently postponed. The details make the case the most horrible that ever disgraced a gibbet in England. At first Lee was perfectly firm and went to the scaffold unflinching. When the first attempt to hang him failed the prisoner's spirit remained unbroken. He was left under the gallows, and walked back to the cell with a firm step. When first placed upon the trap he resigned himself completely, but firmly into the hands of the executioners. He stood motionless during the preliminary proceedings, and when the noose was placed and the spring about to be touched he made an apparent effort to adjust his body to the expected drop so that death might be quick, as possible. When the murderer was made to realize that the gibbet had not done its work and he was not yet hanged, he appeared to start as if from a nightmare but quickly recovered himself. The machinery was then carefully overhauled and woodwork found wet and swollen so that the trap refused to work. After being oiled and tried until thought to be all right the prisoner was again brought forth. The same scene as before was then enacted once again and the wretched man lay away and the trap a second time examined and oiled and for a second time pronounced all right. He for a third time took his stand upon the trap and a third time did the gibbet refuse to do its work. The strain and suspense now overtaxed Lee. He sank down into a swoon and had to be carried away from the place. No words can give an adequate idea of the painful scene. A kind of overpowering dizziness, like that of superintention, seemed to have got control of the sheriff's officers. The gallows became deserted, and no one made any more attempts to put it in working order. The man that was to have been hanged was limp, motionless and in a most pitiable condition, lying in his prison cell dazed and stupefied and physically exhausted. The sheriff decided to abandon his task. He closed up the execution yard and went down to the postoffice and telegraphed to Sir William Vernon Harcourt, home secretary, a full history of the horrible failure to execute Lee, and asking for instructions.

THE REPETITION OF SUCH HORRORS

as the insane asylum fire at West Philadelphia appears to have no effect in suggesting guards against such dangers in other institutions. Not many weeks ago an orphan asylum in Brooklyn was burned and many children perished because there were no means provided for the prompt extinguishment of a fire. Now comes this insane asylum, crowded with helpless humanity, bursting into flame and no proper apparatus at hand to check the flames. Eighteen unfortunate perished miserably and it seems almost a miracle that more did not suffer the same wretched fate. A case of this sort needs something more than the usual mockery of an investigation. If the officials who are to blame were punished and rigid scrutiny were made of other public institutions, we should hear less of these awful calamities.

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
