COMMON COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

The city council met in regular session last evening, a full board present, except Councilman Benjamin; all the officers in attendance. A petition for a street lamp corner West 9th and Cedar streets, was referred to committee on public property.

A communication was read from Chief Engineer Charters, calling the attention of the council to the "serious condition of the engine No. 2 is in at present," and urging "the absolute necessity of having said engine put in proper condition, as even a hour's delay in this case will cause serious, and perhaps fatal injuries to the boiler," and was referred to committee on fire and water, with prayer for action.

LEGISLATOR'S VIEWS.

He Thinks a Special Session should be Called.
 A member of the Multnomah delegation to the legislature was seen yesterday by a News reporter. The gentleman says he thinks the governor should call a special session of the legislature for the purpose of electing a senator to succeed Mr. Slater. If Governor Moody appoints a senator he will undoubtedly be found fault with by many Republicans, which will tend to widen the split in the Republican party, and within two years' time turn the state over to Democrats. If an extra session is called, the matter will be smoothed over, and in three days' time a Republican will be agreed upon and elected. It seems to be the prevailing opinion around town that Mr. Hirsch withdrew his name when he saw that no man anyone else could not be elected. This is incorrect. Mr. Hirsch arose from his seat in the senate at 9 o'clock Friday night, while a ballot was being taken, and addressing his followers, said that if they could elect a senator to do it and let the matter end; but his supporters saw that there was no chance of a choice, and therefore determined to stand by their leader. When the Republicans nominated H. W. Corbett at the caucus Saturday, it was the intention to give that gentleman new votes, and if it was found impossible to elect him, to change to some one else; this the Hirsch men were perfectly willing to do. The minority did everything in their power to defeat the project. Hirsch wanted Raleigh Stott; the kickers kept moving in and out all the time, thus preventing a quorum from being present. Hare, Vorbees and Prosser stood outside the railing, and there not being a quorum in the house, those present had not the authority to detail the sergeant-at-arms to compel the absent gentlemen to take their seats. The Democratic members were starting in the Chamber's hotel, not exactly canvassing, but discussing the situation generally. They afterward said that as the Republicans had the majority it was their right, and consequently they (the Democrats) would not interfere. The Democratic leaders further stated that had the sergeant-at-arms been sent to bring them in they would have returned to their seats and stayed there until a senator had been elected, be he a Republican or a Democrat.—News, 24.
