**SENATE MEASURES.**  
 Following is a complete list of the measures originating in the senate which passed both houses of the legislature, and were signed by the governor:  
 No. 84—Simon's bill for an additional circuit judge at Portland.  
 No. 39—Simon's mechanics' lien law. This bill gives precedence to the claims of laborers, mechanics and material men, and prescribes an easy mode of procedure for their collection.  
 No. 76—By Blyen, prescribing duties of county school superintendents. It provides that of state school fund \$50 shall be given to each district, and that remainder shall be apportioned in proportion to school population in the several districts.  
 No. 149—Simon's bill allowing city and town ordinances, when used in court pleadings to be read by title.  
 No. 135—Permanently locating the state agricultural college at Corvallis, in consideration of the people constructing a college building to cost \$25,000. The bill provides a complete scheme of government and free scholarship—one for each county and for each representative and senatorial district as many as there are members of legislature from said district.  
 No. 144—Simon's bill defining legally the terms "land" and "real property." This measure is to clear up uncertainties in the law, and for convenience of court practice.  
 No. 137—Simon's witness fee bill, providing that witnesses summoned within two miles of the place of meeting of the court shall receive neither fees nor mileage. Bill will only affect Multnomah county practically.  
 No. 46—Providing times for holding circuit court sessions in the second judicial district as follows: Douglas—Third Monday in October and first Monday in May. Curry—Second Monday in June. Coos—Fourth Monday in May and Third Monday in September. Lane—Third Monday in April and first Monday in November. Benton—Fourth Monday in March and third Monday in November. Law comes of effect at once.  
 No. 66—Incorporating McMinnville.  
 No. 71—Incorporating Empire City.  
 No. 92—Providing times for holding terms of circuit court in the fifth district, as follows: Clatsop—Second Monday in January and first Monday in September. Columbia—Second Monday in February and first Monday in July. Clatskanie—First Monday in March and second Monday in November. Wasco—Last Monday in March and last Monday in September. Crook—Third Monday in April and third Monday in October. Washington—First Monday in June and first Monday in September. Law comes of effect at once.  
 No. 95—The Oregon Pacific railroad bill heretofore fully described.  
 No. 65—Incorporating the city of Union.  
 No. 110—Amending Hillsboro charter.  
 No. 134—To incorporate Silverton.  
 No. 136—Permitting separate school districts to be organized in cities of 10,000 inhabitants and upwards.  
 No. 130—Providing times for holding circuit court sessions in the first district—Josephine—Second Monday in April and first Monday in November. Jackson—Second Monday in January and first Monday in May and October. Klamath—Second Monday in June and first Monday in September. Lake—Second Monday in February and third Monday in August. This law comes of effect at once.  
 No. 143—Incorporating Yaquina City.  
 No. 40—This is the Hoult railroad bill regulating freights and fares on railroads in the state.  
 No. 13—By Reed, increasing pay of circuit judges to \$3,000 per year.  
 No. 47—Fixing size of hop boxes as follows: 36 inches long, 30 inches deep and 18 inches wide, measurement upon the inside.  
 No. 48—Declaring that following shall be legal holidays: Every Sunday, the 1st day of January, 22nd of February, 30th of May, 4th of July, 25th of December, every day on which an election is held throughout the state, and every day appointed by the president or governor as a day of public thanksgiving, fast or holiday. Negotiable instruments payable on a legal holiday, become due the next business day.  
 No. 49—Declaring that all bills of exchange, payable at a future day certain, and on all negotiable promissory notes, orders and drafts, payable at a future day certain, in which there is no express stipulation to the contrary, grace shall be allowed as it is allowed by merchants on foreign bills of exchange, but this provision shall not extend to paper payable at sight.  
 No. 49—Incorporating Dallas.  
 No. 79—Providing that upon petition of 100 voters the county authorities shall put the question "shall swine be allowed to run at large" to voters of the county at next general election, majority ruling.  
 No. 80—Declaring all railroads common carriers and declaring authority of state to fix their charges for passengers and freight.  
 No. 112—Incorporating Amity.  
 No. 184—Incorporating Junction City.  
 No. 54—Ricehart's bill requiring railroad companies to make complete statement of their affairs to the secretary of state annually. The list of

questions which they are required to answer goes into every feature of their business in which the public can have any interest.  
 No. 38—By Prim, revising the methods of procedure in criminal cases in court.  
 No. 62—Allowing road work to be commuted at the rate of \$1.50 per day.  
 No. 139—Confirming title to swamp lands to squatters upon them who have completed settlement under the provisions of the homestead or pre-emption laws.  
 No. 150—Legalizing the acts of Santiam academy, whose building and records were destroyed by fire.  
 No. 153—A substitute for the existing attachment law.  
 No. 35—Amending Ashland charter.  
 No. 146—Simon's bill providing compilation of state laws.  
 No. 152—To incorporate Coquille City.  
 No. 122—To incorporate Springfield, Lane county.  
 No. 71—Incorporating Albany.

**THE SEAT OF WAR IN EGYPT.**  
 Gen. R. E. Colston, formerly a bey in Egypt, contributes the opening illustrated article in the March Century, from which we quote the following description of a portion of the present seat of war: "He who has never traveled through the desert can not form a just idea of that strange and marvelous region, in which all the ordinary conditions of life are completely changed. It is essentially a waterless land, without rivers, creeks, rivulets, or springs. Once away from the Nile, the only supply of water is derived from deep wells, few, scanty, and far apart. Long droughts are frequent. When I explored the great Arabian desert between the Nile and the Red sea, it had not rained for three years; and when I traveled over the Suakim route and through Kordofan, no rain had fallen for two years. Between the twenty-ninth and the nineteenth degree of latitude it never rains at all. Water becomes precious to a degree beyond the conception of those who never know its scarcity. Members of the Catholic mission at El Obeidi, where water is much more plentiful than in the desert, assured me that, the summer before, water had been sold as high as half a dollar a gallon by the proprietors of the few wells that had not dried up. When long droughts occur, the always scanty crop of douira falls away from the Nile, and the greater parts of the flocks and herds perish, as well as a considerable part of the population. It follows naturally that when undertaking a journey through the desert, the paramount question is water. A supply must be carried sufficient to last to the next well, be it one or five days distant. It is usually carried in goat and ox skins suspended from the camels' pack saddles. These are the water bottles of Scripture, which become leaky from wear, and always lose a considerable portion of their contents by evaporation. The first thing after reaching a well is to ascertain the quantity and quality of its water. As to the former it may have been exhausted by a preceding caravan, and hours may be required for a new supply to ooze in again. As to the quality, desert water is generally bad, the exception being when it is worse, though long custom enables the Bedouins to drink water so brackish as to be intolerable to all except themselves and their flocks. Well do I remember how at each well the first skintful was tasted all around as espies sip rare wines. Great was the joy if it was pronounced 'wajya Jalya,' sweet water; but if the Bedouins said 'mooah tagit,' not good, we might be sure it was a solution of Epsom salts. The best water is found in natural rocky reservoirs in deep narrow gorges where the sun never shines. As to 'live springs,' I never saw more than half a dozen in six thousand miles' travel."
