COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS. Petitions Read—Ordinances Passed—Claims Allowed—Reports Adopted.

The city council met in regular session last evening. Mayor Hume in the chair; present councilmen Bergman, Cooper, Cleveland, Dealy, Gratke and Trenchard. Minutes of last meeting read and approved after correction.

A petition from Alert H. & L. Co. No. 1, asking for repairs to their truck No. 1, and referred to committee on fire and water with power to act.

A communication from the Gusta Percha & Rubber Manufacturing Co., offering 500 feet carborized hose for \$1.15 per foot was read and placed on file.

A communication from Chief Engineer Charless asking that the city buy 1,000 feet of rubber hose was read and referred to committee on fire and water.

A communication from the California electrical works regarding the Gamewell fire alarm telegraph stating that they were willing to sell to the city.

The report of the committee to whom had been referred the ordinance regarding the taking of cash deposits, recommending the adoption of the ordinance was read and adopted.

Under suspension of the rules a petition from West 3rd street property owners asking that the grade of said street be established was read and referred to street committee.

The health and police committee recommended that \$15 be refunded Michael Denny. Report adopted.

The health and police committee recommended the granting of a liquor license to G. Karvonen. Report adopted.

Street superintendent's report for February was found correct.

ON THE NEKANIKUM. A Case in the Justice Court That Attracted Some Attention.

There has been a case before Justice Goodell for the last three days that has been a source of interest to a few who had time to sit through its tediousness.

It appears that on the Nekaniuk, about twenty-five miles from here, two men, B. Burke and Victor Hansen, have adjoining claims.

Hansen swore out a warrant against Burke for alleged threats and violence, and Constable Bessley went out to arrest him, this being the nearest justice precinct where he last elected justice of the peace had qualified.

Bessley got to Burke's house at 6 o'clock Saturday morning and had considerable difficulty in coaxing him to come along, he finally being obliged to insist and enforce the warrant by a display of arms as a stand-off to Burke's declaration that he wouldn't go and couldn't be made go.

F. D. Winton appeared for Hansen and J. A. Gill for Burke, and the evidence fills sundry folios. It ended in most elaborate legal argument at the close of which Justice Goodell held Mr. Burke in the sum of \$500 to keep the peace.

He furnished bonds for the amount and left for home with his ideas considerably modified regarding the ability of an Astoria constable to bring what he went after.

REMARKS BY THE FISH TRAPS. STATE OF OREGON, EXAMINER OF FISH TRAPS, SALEM, March 23, 1885.

A. Schuring, Esq., Astoria. DEAR SIR: I am requested by his excellency the governor to say in response to your telegram of yesterday that there was not sufficient time for the forwarding of the memorial calling for the removal or regulation of traps in the Columbia river, so that it could reach congress in time to be considered before its adjournment on March 4th.

We are informed that the secretary of state has not yet forwarded it, as it could not in any event have been considered by congress during the present session, and as his work upon other important measures has absorbed his entire time since the closing of the session of the legislature.

It is the opinion of the governor that the matter could now be most effectually reached by a direct appeal to the secretary of war from those who are directly interested in the fishing interests at the mouth of the Columbia. It is not probable, however, that the secretary of war will act upon a mere telegram from the governor without a full and comprehensive statement of the urgent necessity of immediate action.

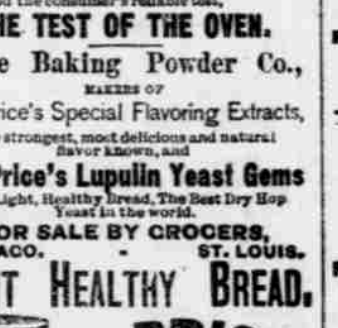

The Spring Bonnet. There is some improvement in the shapes of bonnets and hats for spring. The capote, which is a Fanebon with a brim, is restored to popular favor. And the peaked urim poke is made larger in the back, covering more of the hair, and at the same time it is made wider and more flaring in the front. Hats have not undergone much change. They still come with a large semi-conical crown, and brim wider and more flaring in the front than in the back, and they can be worn either far off the forehead or on it. The ostrich feathers are restored to favor as hat trimmings, and tips are used for hats. The trimmings are all arranged to increase the size of the hat in front and high on the crown. Fancy feathers and flowers will also be used, and velvet, plush and ribbon. The fancy for sticking large silver and gilt pins, with jeweled ornament heads, through the trimmings of hats and bonnets, and frequently through the velvet, plush or straw of the hat itself, is as marked as ever.
