It is thought that the Central Pacific will soon begin work on the Oregon and California extension. There remains only 150 miles between the termini in California and that in Oregon.

It is said that a proposition was submitted to President Cleveland, on Saturday, by Dr. Demargo on behalf of the United States of Colombia, having reference to the acquisition by the United States of commercial supremacy in the South American States.

If a Woman's Rights party should ever triumph in Great Britain that country would become a land of Amazons. The females now outnumber the males by 700,000, and the disproportion is likely to be increased, as the stress of competition drives young men to foreign lands to seek their fortunes.

UNITED STATES ARMY OFFICERS on this coast have organized the military association of the Pacific. The president is Maj.-Gen. John Pope; vice presidents, Col. A. V. Kautz, eighth infantry; Lieut. Col. H. M. Lazelle, twenty-third infantry; Maj. R. T. Frank, first artillery; secretary and treasurer, First Lieut. Adam Slaker, first artillery. Executive committee Lieut. Col. H. M. Lazelle, Capt. W. L. Haskin, first artillery; First Lieut. Edward J. McClelland, second cavalry. The object of the association is to enable its members to interchange ideas, with a view of stimulating exertion and encouraging study and research.

In consequence of the notice given to the navy department that a Colombian gunboat had appeared off the river San Buenaventura, and had cut the cable between Central and South America, the United States steamer Wachusett has been ordered from Panama to La Union to protect cable property. The United States vessels on the Pacific station, are the Hartford, a screw steamer of 14 guns and 1,800 tons burden; the Shenandoah, a screw steamer of 9 guns and 925 tons; the Lackawanna, a screw steamer of 9 guns and 2,220 tons; the Wachusett, screw, seven guns and 695 tons; Iroquois, of the same number of guns and tonnage. The Hartford has left Valparaiso for the Hawaiian islands, and will reach San Francisco sometime in May. The Lackawanna is now at Mare Island, and will go out of commission about the middle of this month.

The Yakima Republican says: Nelson Bennett, railroad contractor, much prefers to employ white men to Chinese. Recently he wanted 200 white men for this division and telegraphed the company's officials at St. Paul to know if the men could be obtained in that section. Steps were immediately taken to enlist the men from the Scandinavian settlers of Minnesota. A proposition was made to men with families only. The company offers to bring them from St. Paul to North Yakima at a rate of \$25 for adults and \$12.50 for children, and to carry their household and other goods at the rate of \$100 per car, which is only half the usual rates. The families are coming. Similar propositions at slightly increased rates have been made to a like class of settlers in Manitoba, who desire to come to Washington, and the arrival of a large party from that quarter may be anticipated at no distant day. These parties are promised work for one year at \$2 per day.

In an exhaustive article on canned goods, The London Medical Times says: "The evidence derived from communities almost or entirely dependent upon tinned food is overwhelming in favor of its wholesomeness. We believe that the public is itself mainly responsible for the scare, if scarce there be, in this matter of tinned foods, and that, so far as is possible in human affairs, the evil results we hear of every now and again may always be avoided by exercising in the case of tinned articles of diet just so much care as should be bestowed upon the purchase and the after treatment of ordinary butchers' meat." Commenting editorially in the same strain, the Liverpool Mercury concludes by saying: "It can hardly be doubted that as the modes of preserving are improved and perfected, and the quality of the meats and fruits supplied becomes more uniform and reliable, the trade will very considerably increase. A great future is before it. Abundant supplies on the one hand, and waiting and expectant consumers on the other, should result in a commerce beneficial to all concerned."

BLAINE, says a Washington correspondent, is still busy on his new book. He expects to have it completed by the middle of the summer, and is very well pleased with what he has already done. He has a critical eye, and has the rare quality of being as able to criticize his own work as that of another. He expects this work to live and to give him a name when a long line of ex-presidents have sunk out of sight. He is reported to have been very well pleased with Mr. Cleveland, and to have expressed the opinion, after his call upon Mr. Cleveland at the White house a few days ago, that the new administration would be a success. He thinks Mr. Cleveland meant every word he said in his inaugural, and that he is not to be moved or shaken in his determination by any amount of political pressure. It is the general impression here in Washington that Mr. Blaine feels friendly towards Mr. Cleveland and thinks it will be the duty of the Republicans in congress to give the president every possible backing in carrying out the policy he has laid down.



EDWARD J. PHELPS. The appointment of Edward J. Phelps of Burlington, Vermont, to the court of St. James was a veritable surprise to all; not only was Mr. Phelps unknown to the general public, but Vermont is the very Gibraltar of Republicanism, and nobody ever imagined that that state would pluck one of the finest plums which it is in the power of the executive to give. Mr. Phelps, however little known to the public, has an excellent record as a lawyer, and is a professor in the law school of Yale college. In his native city of Burlington he is one of the most prominent barristers. He is 60 years of age. His father, Samuel S. Phelps, was a prominent lawyer and whig politician of his day, having for several years occupied the position of judge of the supreme court of Vermont, and was twice in the state senate. The new minister studied law with Senator Edmunds. He is an ex-president of the American bar association. He has also been prominent in the councils of the Democratic party, and was several times their candidate for governor of Vermont, but has as far as known held no public office. As a lecturer before the graduating class of Yale he is most popular with the students, and his convictions on the tariff question lean to free trade. He is counsel for the Vermont Central railroad, which serving on a committee of the American bar association which was appointed to consider the subject of the relief of the pressure of business in the supreme court of the United States. Mr. Phelps was most prominent in debate, which is more remarkable when we consider that the committee was made up of such men as John W. Stevenson, of Ky.; Rufus King, of Va.; R. L. Weston, of Ga.; C. S. Bradley, of R. I.; H. Hitecock, of Mo.; C. Parker, of N. J.; and W. M. Evans of New York. He presided at the annual dinner of the bar association at Saratoga in 1883. On the whole Mr. Phelps represents the best element of his party, and cultivated, learned, witty, and practical as he is, he cannot help make his influence felt in the position to which he has been elevated.

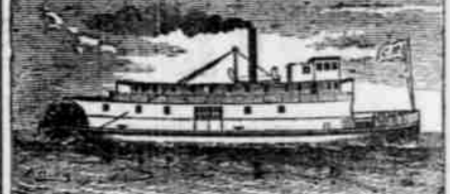

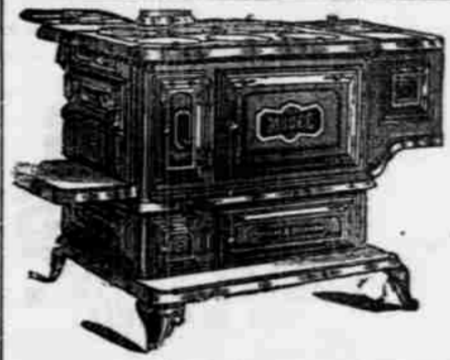
