IMPROVING THE COLUMBIA.

At a recent meeting of the Portland board of trade the following resolutions were adopted:

WHEREAS, The vast extent of country drained by the Columbia river and its tributaries, embracing nearly two hundred thousand square miles of valuable lands, is entitled to every aid that the national government can extend towards the improvement of its waterways, and the increase of its lakes and rivers as may cheapen the carriage of its products to the seaboard and to foreign countries. Therefore be it

Resolved, That a committee of five be appointed by the chair to consider and report upon the advisability of calling a convention of delegates from commercial bodies, and municipalities throughout such parts of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana, as are drained by the Columbia river and its tributaries, to concert measures for obtaining from the national government such treatment of the subject as its importance merits and demands:

Resolved, That in the selection of the committee the chair be not restricted to members of this board. The action of the board of trade will meet with hearty co-operation in this section of country. The difficulties in the way are great, but the greater the obstacles to success the greater the incentive to overcome them. Unity of effort is essential and determination will win.

THE RIGHT POLICY.

YESTERDAY'S Washington Post prints an interview between Captain Couch, leader of the Oklahoma boomers, and the secretary of the interior, in regard to Oklahoma. Secretary Lamar said:

"What is it you wish?"
"I want to know what course the administration has determined to pursue with reference to Oklahoma and the settlers," replied Captain Couch.

"Well, sir, I will state to you the policy of this administration with regard to this Oklahoma country," said the secretary. "It considers the Oklahoma territory, on which the persons you represent are proposing to make settlements, as within the part of Indian territory. The administration regards it as not a part of the public domain, open to entry and settlement and acquisition of titles under the laws of the United States. Being Indian country—that is territory acquired and reserved for Indian occupancy—the government is pledged to the protection of the Indians from intruders. No white persons have a right to go there and reside without a permit, and when they go they are intruders, who are there illegally and wrongfully. The policy of the president is to execute the pledge of the government, and to protect this territory from intrusion of white persons who claim they have a right to enter upon it, and that it was public domain, subject to preemption and homestead settlement."

"Is that the final decision?" asked Capt. Couch.

"It is, and it will be enforced," replied Mr. Lamar.

In reply to further questions, Secretary Lamar said the administration was determined there should be no more cattle men on the reservation. They will not be permitted to graze cattle within the limits of that territory. He repeated this declaration with emphasis.

The register and the receiver of the United States land office at Walla Walla have received a telegram from Commissioner Sparks, revoking the order of Acting Commissioner Harrison, dated March 20, changing the terminal limits of the Northern Pacific railroad in this vicinity. It is believed that the revocation of the order has been secured by misrepresentation. Great indignation and uneasiness are everywhere manifest. Settlers who have purchased railroad lands, who feel that their homes are imperiled, are flocking in and discovering various means of protecting their rights, and some even swear they will hang or shoot the first man or land-shark who tries to jump their lands. It was the settlers in the first place who demanded the change, and not the railroad company.

The prospect of an English-Russo war has already elicited comments regarding the position the two nations assumed when we had our little difficulty. Then England sided with the south, sneered at our generals, ennobled the confederacy, prophesied dissolution, fitted out war vessels, which preyed upon our commerce, and did all she could to aid the south. Russia sent a fleet with instructions to the admiral in command to report at New York and tender his services to President Lincoln.

coln. England overstepped the courtesy of nations in gleeful effort to destroy this country. Russia stood by the Union and cheered with comfort and counsel the men who wore the blue.

THERE was a meeting of dairymen in Portland last Monday to form a dairymen's association. The organization was completed by the election of J. B. Knapp as president, H. B. Hathaway as secretary and Plympton Kelly treasurer. Much interest was manifested in the subject of the meeting and the dairy interests of Oregon and Washington.

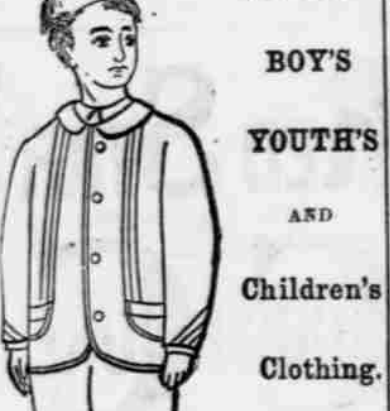
