## MEN WHO DISAPPEAR.

Professional and Business Men Who Go Astray From Overwork.

Mr. Conant belonged to a class which, taken in the larger sense, includes nearly all professional men - physicians, lawyers and clergymen, as well as journalists. This class is misnamed the intellectual class, for the work of merchants, bankers, inventors, builders, in fact all men who are required to necessarily use their judgment and designing faculties, is as strictly intellectual as that of the man who edits a newspaper, writes a poem or composes a sermon. Bankers and builders, merchants and master mechanics break down as frequently as editors and preachers, the only difference being that they are not so prominent and consequently not so much talked about. I know a floor-walker in a great dry goods store whose mental organization is exactly like that of certain clergymen and journalists, and once in a while he breaks down just as some preachers and editors do, and for the same reason. I know a contractor who is of pure mind and correct habits, but for once, after having secured a contract in which there was a sure little fortune, strayed from home and was not found and brought back until his family and business friends had given away to the cruellest suspicions as to the cause of his disappearance. What is the matter with these men? Well, the same trouble that drives thousands of women to the madhouse, the invalid chamber, or untimely death, their work is never done - not if they are fit for their respective positions. A managing journalist may have the pleasant position and most considerate employers in the work, but his paper is never so good but he wants it better; his competitors are as energetic as himself, and the doings of the day will not arrange themselves according to the mental convenience of any man alive. So the editor falls into a rut - that is, he gives his entire time and thought to his work. His office hours may end daily at a stated time, but his work does not end with them; he fills one pocket with manuscripts, another with books, takes a handful of newspapers and starts for home to continue his daily routine. In the course of time he finds himself getting forgetful or sluggish of mind; then he consults either a physician or a bar-keeper and swallows whatever is given him. With the relief thus temporarily obtained he goes on, imagining himself cured, but soon he finds himself obliged to return for stronger doses.

In the course of time stimulants, no matter how honestly taken, cease to stimulate, for the simple reason that nothing is left to work upon. The man is used up and the day comes when he does anything else, begins to turn upon and destroy himself, just as any other broken down machine always does. But where one editor falls in this way, a score of professional men follow suit. - New York Correspondence Pittsburg Dispatch.

## STORING UP MORAL FORCE.

Every day you meet dozens of elderly people in whose faces there is no clear intelligence - their features wooden or animalish, their eyes muddy, false. Yet they were once bright and young as you are; they dreamed as you dream, of great and good things to come. And they had moments of serious thought and high resolve. All these damaged old people are so many one young. What are the causes of failure? Probably some of them are victims of blighting misfortune or injustice; possibly some of them passed through their early years without adequate guidance, wise instruction or kindly encouragement. But multitudes have failed from unfaithfulness to themselves from an indolent moral habit; from a neglect of every-day advantages - always from some inward defect.

None of us can live well by an occasional good resolution. Everything depends on storing up yourselves an ever increasing fund of moral power, which shall always be available to sustain you in carrying out your best purpose. Unless you are willing to live as moral tramps on the brink of inward poverty and misery, we must invest our all in this higher business, so that every transaction of life shall yield us spiritual income. Nothing is secure until we are established in right habits, rooted and grounded in heavenly principles. We want to become fixed and unchangeably good. This comes from making the love of good, which is identical with the love of God, the supreme and controlling law, the central interest and the fountain of motives. We shall do better than keep ourselves decent; we shall be purer and truer than the world asks us to be; we shall require of ourselves a higher standard than our best friends expect. We shall be continually transformed by the renewing of our minds.

The main question is not "What is to become of me?" but "What are we to become?" Nor is the answer difficult. We need not wrestle painfully with questions of doctrine, nor wait to construct creed. If we are simply faithful - if we follow the light that God gives, if we are humble enough to learn from all sources, and yet firmly true to reason and conscience - we cannot miss the road; we shall move toward our true place in the universe.

## THE AFFAIR AT PANAMA.

We are now fairly launched on the business of an armed occupation of the isthmus, and the question arises, how long will this last and where will it end? We note that the French consul is said to have protested, but he was evidently in ignorance of Admiral Perron's statements to M. De Lesseps. When he gets the news from home he will be sorry he put himself forward in the matter. It is evidently not the intention of the French government to protect the Panama railway though it is French property. France distinctly notifies us that she looks to us to do police duty on the isthmus. And who knows how long the duty may have to be performed? Aizparr may be killed tomorrow, and so many Frescos; but other handi-chiefs will take their places. The isthmus rabble have got the taste of blood and they will raid Panama whenever they can and threaten to burn it unless it is ransomed. Our interstate commerce, as well as our treaty obligations, may compel us to make our occupation permanent. Mr. Cleveland may as well make up his mind that there is no present prospect of his getting rid of his elephant.

This will involve an entirely new departure in our foreign policy. American administrations have always refused to occupy with arms points in foreign countries. On several occasions they have been solicited to hold places in Central America for the protection of life and property in insurrectionary times, but they have always refused. The traditional policy of the nation has been to keep hands off foreign territory. Now, it seems, we are forced to break through the rule and one cannot help wondering what will be the end of the new order of things. Who will pay the cost of the occupation of the Panama railroad? Will our marines be subject to the laws of Panama? Suppose Colombia should order our troops to withdraw, ought we to obey or refuse?

Mr. Bayard now has an opportunity of showing his mettle as a statesman and it is to be hoped he will make better use of it than he did in the case of Guatemala. How would it do to buy the isthmus out and out, French canal and all? If it were American territory it would be natural that we should send troops to protect it. But as it is, is not the American flag rather out of place on Colombian soil? And if it be furled, what security have we that the railroad will not be torn up and that Panama - which belongs largely to Americans - will not share the fate of Colon.
