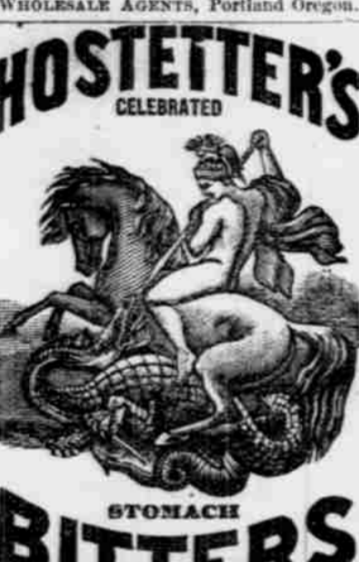

AMERICAN ARBITRATION.

We notice that a British member of parliament proposed to Mr. Gladstone to submit the Anglo-Russian controversy to the arbitration of the United States. The premier evaded the suggestion, for obvious reasons. The source of the trouble lies too deep for friendly arbitration; there is no case on which arbitrators could act. Russia has made up her mind to absorb Afghanistan, and the only question is whether England will let her do so peacefully or fight for her ally. But the event shows that the nations of Europe are realizing that the United States is becoming a power to be consulted in future changes in the map of the world. It is quite likely that, as this country grows in population, if it adheres to the policy of honesty and fair dealing with all nations, and sets its face against the robbery of weak powers, it will come to exercise an influence that has seldom been wielded by any nation in history. The events of the past few days suggest curious fancies. It has seemed at times as though the skill of Russian diplomats might succeed in banding France, Germany and Turkey, all the fighting powers of Europe, against England. Such a coalition would be practically irresistible. Where could England look for an ally? There was a time, only twenty-five years ago, when Great Britain might have had this country under such a weight of obligation that hardly any sacrifice would have seemed too large for a grateful people to offer in requital. But she let the chance go by, and her public men and her newspapers, instead of conciliating the United States, vied with each other in trying to annoy and irritate us. Had it been otherwise, who can tell what might not have been the effect just now on the mind of Russia of a strong remonstrance from the United States? It is perhaps well that we are not tempted to be led away by such sentimental considerations. We are best without entangling alliances and borrowed quarrels. It cannot be said that American people feel like going to work to sustain the British empire in India. But when we read in the papers about France landing 40,000 men in India to help Russia we cannot help thinking what a different face would be put on the whole matter if any accident compelled the United States to take a hand in the fight.

WASHINGTON, May 5.—What bothers secretary Bayard most in his new position is the cypher used in transmitting diplomatic secrets by telegraph. He has not been able to get the key to the cypher yet, and when he receives a dispatch it is a great source of annoyance to him. He goes to the department generally at 10:30 or 11 o'clock, having the early morning mail delivered at his house, so that he can attend to it without being forced to eat an early breakfast. He has been in public life longer than some of the other cabinet officers, and knows that an early breakfast brings on indigestion. When the mail is brought in there are frequently a number of dispatches also. They set him into a state of nervous excitement. He will tear open a dispatch that reads something like this: "Combination, Rats, Horseradish and veal. Metaphysical tonics. Shoot it! Rpgz bang! Struck an oil well in the sea," etc., etc. Then he will read it over, turn it upside down, try to read it backward or up and down, and by the time his secretary arrives he is thoroughly bewildered and dis- and disgusted.

THE CARRYING TRADE.

A sensational dispatch from the east states that there is some talk of an extra session, in the event of war, to repeal the registration laws, so that foreign vessels can register under the American flag. There is no probability of anything of the kind. It would do no good to Americans to have British vessels transferred to the American flag so long as they retained their British ownership, and in the present condition of the freight market there is no prospect that Americans would buy British vessels. If we could make merchandise of our flag, we might charge \$5 or \$10 a ton for the privilege of American registry, but Russia would not be likely to respect such a purchased nationality, and it is quite certain we wouldn't fight to protect it. One thing must always be borne in mind in considering the questions of the shipping laws. There are competent shipbuilders who declare that we could, if we saw fit, build ships in this country as cheaply and as well as they do in England. We do not do so because thus far it has paid us better to use capital and labor in other pursuits. It has, on the whole, paid Americans better to build railroads and to leave to Great Britain the seagoing transportation of the world. She has secured something like a monopoly of it, and the consequence is that a large proportion of her merchant marine is laid up and some of her most profitable lines of steamers are only paying 3 per cent on the investment. British ship-owners, as a whole, would have done as well if they had put their money in the funds and built no ships at all. We should have had the like fortune had we embarked in the business, and who can say, on a review of the situation as it stands, that we have lost anything by keeping out of it? There may come a time in this country when capitalists will be satisfied with 3 per cent for the interest of money, and there may come a time when ocean steamships may earn more than 3 per cent net. When that time comes we shall doubtless re-enter the business, and we shall probably compete with the English to advantage, as we did during the fifteen years before the war. In the mean time if war breaks out, a time may come when the registration laws may be advantageously modified. But there is no sort of hurry in the matter and no call whatever for an extra session.

LONDON, May 5.—It is rumored on the London stock exchange that Earl Dufferin has resigned the office of viceroy of India. The Globe of today says the so-called adjustment of the Anglo-Russian dispute is a poor shift, which amounts practically to nothing more than a truce for averting collision, which will result in nothing but a transfer of the difficulty from Gladstone's shoulders to those of his successor.

SASKATCHEWAN LANDING, via Swift Current, N. W. T. May 5.—A mail courier has just arrived from Battledford with the following dispatch, dated May 3: A flying column of 300 men from Battledford had an engagement with Poundmaker's forces of 600 Indians at his reserve, lasting from 5 a. m. to noon yesterday. The troops lost eight killed and twelve wounded. The Indian loss is estimated at fifty. The Otter covered, including the engagement, seventy miles, fought the battle and returned inside of thirty hours.

LONDON, May 5.—In the house of commons this afternoon, Gladstone, in answer to questions, stated that Sir Peter Lumsden, the British Afghan boundary commissioner and Col. Stewart had been ordered to come home immediately.
