THE AFGHAN DISPUTE.

The English Government Censured on All Sides.
NEW YORK, May 6.—A special to the Times from London says: "London is simply speechless with rage this afternoon at last night's disclosures. Gladstone had few cheers, save from the radical benches below the gangway. Lord Churchill's long speech was really a masterly indictment, and it is in every mouth to-day. Its indignant words are quoted on all sides, as they were cheered to the echo last night. Every one feels that such a vast contrast as that afforded by Gladstone's speech of a week ago and the statement he made last night does not exist elsewhere in the history of politics, not even in his own career, and the bitterness of wrath at him defies description. To-day we are getting the first installment of a new series of foreign jeers over English cowardice, from Berlin, Paris, Dublin and even Rome, and you can imagine how they sting."

LONDON, May 6.—A dispatch from Spina, to the Reuter telegram company, says that Sir Peter Lumsden has resigned the position of British Afghan boundary commissioner, because of his inability to agree with the policy of the home government. Lord Churchill, addressing a conservative meeting to-night, protested against the commission on the frontier delimitation being removed to London, to be dealt with by imbeciles at the foreign office. Russia, he said, had always objected to the presence of General Sir Peter Lumsden, and now the government had gratified Russia by recalling General Lumsden. It was time for the Tories to endeavor to bring about a change in the advisers of the crown by refusing supplies.

LONDON, May 7.—The Daily News is authorized to deny that Russia has stipulated that England shall not occupy Port Hamilton. The News believes Russia has offered England positive assurance that she has no intention of taking Herat.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 6.—There is no appearance here of any abatement in the warlike preparations. The mobilizing of rifle battalions in Finland continues.

COPENHAGEN, May 6.—The King of Denmark has informed Russia that he is willing to act as arbitrator if he was so requested by England.

NEW YORK, May 6.—Herald's Dublin special: "Much jubilation is being made by nationalists over the news of the Bosphore Egyptian matter, and to Russia in the Penjsh affair. 'England's humiliation makes Ireland's revenge,' said a leading barrister. To the present perplexities of Downing street are soon to be added that of renewing the coercion and crimes act, which, in its present shape, shortly expires. Lord Spencer has plainly said that unless it is renewed in that shape, without modification, he will resign."

LONDON, May 6.—The Times this morning complains of the reticence and ambiguity of the statements of the government in regard to the Afghan question. It severely criticizes the action of the government in recalling Sir Peter Lumsden, as the frontier question will be all settled before he can possibly arrive in London, and that, therefore, any information he may have will be worthless so far as negotiations with Russia in London are concerned. The Times also says that a change of purpose of the ameer of Afghanistan has placed matters in a different position, and that it is time to make him understand that he must strongly garrison Herat, or at least allow the English to superintend the fortification of the place. Even if peace is temporarily secured, it would be madness to waste the time thus gained, which at best can but be small.

The Standard, in an editorial, says: "The recall of Lumsden completes the picture of English humbug."

Manning's statements, comparing dollar for dollar and cent for cent, with those of his predecessors, using the very same items, differing only in arrangement, prove those assertions regarding an enormous surplus, which Hendricks and Randall declared to be \$200,000,000, concealed under crooked and fraudulent figures, to be infamous falsehoods. Republican civil service reform also convicts the Democratic party of untruth every hour of Cleveland's administration. If the old officials were rascals who should be made to go, why are there so few found who can be removed for cause? Nearly 100,000 Republicans still remain in office, because, under the civil service rules, no sufficient pretext for their removal can be trumped up against them.

Three Men Drowned.

SPokane Falls, W. T., May 6.—News was received here to-day of the drowning of three men in the Columbia river Thursday April 30th. While on his first trip from the little dories the new steamer Kootenai was moored in the channel of the river at the foot of Kootenai rapids, where the current was very swift. The crew were busily engaged in preparing to line the boat over the rapids, and as the steamer occupied this position a row boat from Farwell, containing James M. Potter, of Spokane Falls, Nelse Halberg, Charles Jacobson, Nelse Olberg and a man known as Eric, four Swedes who had been at work on the Canadian Pacific railroad, attempted to run the rapids. They were repeatedly warned and urged not to attempt the foolhardy trip while the steamer occupied the channel of the river; but they would not listen to advice and started over the rapids. As was expected the water ran so swiftly that the men could not manage the craft, and it struck the steamer, was dashed to pieces and the men were precipitated into the river. Every effort was made to save the lives of the unfortunate voyagers, but Halberg, Jacobson and Eric were lost. Potter and Olberg were rescued with considerable difficulty, and taken back to Farwell by the steamer.

WASHINGTON, May 6.—Treasurer Jordan says the treasury check is practically over and everything is found most satisfactory. The three silver dollars which escaped from a broken package in the silver vault have been found, so the only discrepancy is two cents missing from a \$5 package of pennies in the cash room. Yesterday a heavy square box, wrapped in red tape and securely bound was found in an out-of-the-way nook of the vault. The key was mislaid, so a locksmith opened the box, and it was found to contain a bottle of diamonds, a bottle of pearls, a bottle of otar of roses and a lump of gold. One of the old employees identified the articles as presents to President Monroe about the year 1823 from the Japanese government and which had been stored in the treasury pending the passage of an act by congress authorizing their acceptance. Congress failed to legislate on the subject and the articles were deposited in the treasury where they have remained ever since.
