ENGLAND'S BACK DOWN.
Gladstone's Policy Sustained by a Majority
Vote.

LONDON, May 11. - Granville, in the
house of lords this afternoon, reply-
ing to an interrogatory put by Mar-
quis Salisbury, conservative leader,
said the government was unable at
present to make any statement of their
intentions respecting the
Soudan. In regard to the Afghan
boundary question, Granville said a
conference had been held between
himself, the earl of Kimberley, secre-
tary for India, and Baron de Stael,
Russian minister at London, which
resulted in an agreement perfectly
satisfactory to England, Russia and
Earl Dufferin.

Lord Hartington, secretary for war,
stated in the house of commons this
afternoon that the decision reached
by the government in regard to the
Soudan practically involved the aban-
donment of the advance on Khartoum.
Hartington, continuing, said
the government had resolved to make
Wady Halfa the most advanced posi-
tion for the permanent defence of
Egypt. British troops would be with-
drawn as soon as the Nile rises. It
is expected that the rising will occur
about the end of May. The with-
drawal of troops involved the aban-
donment of the advance on Khartoum.
(This statement was received with
cheers from the government
benches.) Efforts will be made said
the war secretary, to establish an ad-
ministration in the province of Dong-
gola, and to complete the Nile rail-
way as a commercial enterprise.

Gladstone announced that he was
about to present to the house some
of the most important papers in regard
to the foreign policy of England in her
relations with Afghanistan. Glad-
stone then stated that an arrange-
ment had been effected between Earl Gran-
ville, foreign secretary, Earl Kimber-
ley, secretary for India, and Baron de
Stael, Russian minister to England,
and M. Lessar, special Russian agent
at London, in regard to the Afghan
frontier. The arrangement was satis-
factory to her majesty's government
and to Earl Dufferin, viceroy of In-
dia. He hoped the arrangement
would be made subject to a conven-
tion with Russia.

General Lord Wolseley, Lord Har-
tington said, had advised the govern-
ment to retire to Assouan from the
Soudan. General Wolseley attached
great importance to sending armed
boats to Egypt, to be used in patrol-
ling the Nile. The government has
no intention, the speaker said, of evac-
uating Suakem, until some arrange-
ment can be effected for holding it
against hostile Arabs, either by Eng-
land or some other civilized nation.
At present Suakem could not be held
without fighting. Osman Digma, El
Mahdi's chief lieutenant, for many
months past has been besieging the
place, and has frequently declared
himself determined upon driving the
garrison into the Red sea. Therefore,
the holding of Suakem was a military
and not a political question.

In regard to the projected railway
from Suakem to Berber, Lord Har-
tington said he was unable to state
what was the definite intention of
the government, but he thought he
would soon be able to make a state-
ment of their intention.
Henry Chapman, conservative for
Middox, Lincolnshire, asked how
much the government had spent on
the Khartoum expedition, and if the
sum was greater than the \$22,500,000
mentioned in the \$55,000,000 vote as
the sum requested for the Soudan
account.

Gladstone replied to this interroga-
tory, and said the government had al-
ready spent a great deal of money in
the Soudan, but were unable to say
at present whether any portion of the
\$22,500,000 would be saved. Glad-
stone then moved for the second
reading of the consolidated fund bill
(the \$55,000,000 credit). He urged
his motion in a speech, in which he
declared he was unable to understand
the differences which existed on this
subject between the opposition and
the government. He urged the house
to avoid every unnecessary issue just
now.

No sooner had Mr. Gladstone quit
speaking than the conservatives op-
posed him and his government the
bitterest attack within their pow-
er to make. This was led by Lord
George Francis Hamilton, member
from Middlesex. Lord Hamilton is
being strongly pushed forward by
the Tories as leader in the commons.
He was under secretary for India
from 1874 to 1878, and spoke with
some degree of authority. He secured
occasion for making his attack by
moving consideration of the notice of
Sir Stafford Northcote, present con-
servative leader in the commons, of
last Friday. This amendment is on
the second reading of the consolida-
ted fund bill for a fresh vote of censure
against the government, and con-
cludes in the following words: "The
house having shown their readiness
to vote supplies, refuse their assent
until informed of the present policy
and purpose for which the money to
be granted is to be applied."

Lord Hamilton, in moving consid-
eration to his amendment said: "The
Right Honorable Marquis of Hart-
ington, secretary of state for war, has
just made the most extraordinary
statement which ever fell from a min-
ister in this house. After announc-
ing their intention of taking Khartoum
the government have announced
abandoning the Soudan, after having
murdered 6,000 or 10,000 men. Yet

the government expects this house
silently to acquiesce silently in their
policy. The greatest danger to a
country is incapacity of men in office.
(Conservative cheers) The govern-
ment have surrendered every one of
the questions between them and Rus-
sia. The prime minister has alto-
gether abandoned the attitude by
which the government obtained a
vote of credit. The great objection
that I have to the premier's policy is
that, from the very day he assumed
office until now, he has shown a
readiness to sacrifice anybody and
anything to save himself. (Cries of
"Hear! hear!")
Chamberlain, president of the board
of trade, taunted Lord George Ham-
ilton with inconsistency in asking
for information from a government
that could not be relied on. Cham-
berlain said the house would be un-
able to adequately judge the con-
duct of the government until all the
papers in the case were presented.
He contended that the object of Sir
Peter Lumsden's mission had to a
great extent, been achieved. He was
glad to find Lord George Hamilton
advocating the position that faith
should not be placed in Russia, and
the only course was to go to war.
When the general elections come,
the government would remind the
opposition of their policy, and it
would then be seen whether the
country was tired of peace.

Lord Hamilton's motion was de-
feated, 200 to 260. The majority con-
sisted entirely of liberals. Parnel-
lites voted with the minority. The
house received the result rather list-
lessly.

Speaking of the opening of the
quail seasons in California, the San
Francisco Bulletin says: "They are
now so abundant that they are
travelling by the roads. While rewards
are offered by farmers in southern
counties for killing this bird, which
destroys much grain, the Alameda
and Contra Costa farmers say the quail is
useful to them. It attacks their grain
only as a last resort, and chiefly
subsists upon insects. Their de-
struction of ants is of incalculable im-
portance. The quail's great foe is the
wildcat. The latter animal is prolific
in the counties named. A quail nest-
ing will cover fifteen to twenty eggs,
and nearly every egg will hatch.
They nest once a year, and during
such periods the male is a most pugnacious
defender of the mother and
young. A man may almost strike
him with a club. The wily wildcat,
as large as four ordinary cats, will
stretch himself out and put out his
tongue; the male quail will approach
and peck it, whereat the cat seizes
his throat and preys."
