STEAMSHIP LOST AT SEA.

HALIFAX, May 11.—The White

Cross line Belgian steamer *Helvetia*,

with general cargo which started

from Antwerp April 23rd for Mont-

real, sunk off Scatteria, Cape Breton,

on Saturday. This is the fourth

steamer of that line which has been

lost within as many years. In 1861

the steamer *August C. Andre* sailed

from New York for Antwerp and was

never heard of. In the fall of 1883,

the *Herman Ludwig* sailed from

Montreal for Antwerp with a crew of

thirty men and cargo, and that was

the last heard of her. Thirteen

months ago the *Daniel Steinhann*

crashed on the rocks at Sambro

islands and 124 lives were lost. The

*Helvetia* makes the fourth vessel

that has met with disaster. A rather

remarkable coincidence is that Cap-

tain Schoonhoven, who commanded

the *Daniel Steinhann*, was also in

command of the *Helvetia*, and this

was the first passage across the At-

lantic which he had made since the

wreck of the *Steinhann*. The *Hel-*

*vetia* arrived in the Gulf of St. Law-

rence about a week ago, and had been

knocking about in the ice seven or

eight days when the snow was in

front of her, and she was otherwise

damaged by ice, and was leaking badly

on Friday, when Captain Schoonhoven

left Cape Ray and bore up for Sid-

ney, having all the while to keep

his ship afloat. Saturday a heavy

snow sprang up and he hailed the Al-

lan steamer *Arctian* which was

passing. The *Arctian* took the

*Helvetia* in tow and headed for

Louisburg, but had not gone far

before Captain Schoonhoven called

that he was sinking. Boats were

lowered and passengers and crew got

into them as soon as possible, but

hardly got clear before the *Helvetia*

careened over and sunk. The steam-

er *Arctian* then put back to the

strait of Canso and landed the sur-

vivors at Port Hawkesbury.

Idaho Mormons Defy the Law.

SALT LAKE, May 11.—A letter dated

the 10th, received from Oxford, Idaho,

says: "The greatest excitement pro-

ceeds at Bear Lake. On the 5th war-

arrants were placed in the hands of

three deputy marshals for the arrest

of eight polygamists at and around
