Salmon shipments for April this year were 6,194 cases, against 1,975 cases the same month last year.

The British bark *Caracura Castle*, 729, Griffiths master, 85 days from Sydney, is outside with a pilot on board.
R. V. Monteith, Post-Commander Cushing Post No. 14, G. A. R., is making arrangements for proper celebration of Memorial Day, the 30th inst.
And yet no official notification received concerning the forfeiture of the Astoria land grant. Has Sparks exhausted all his fire and energy on the N. P. domain?
The British iron bark *Demostriant*, 1045 tons, has been taken up by Meyer, Wilson, & Co. for Liverpool, loading private. It is understood that she will load salmon here.

The change racket fiend was discharged yesterday there being no evidence to hold him. He'd best skip fast and far, as the water here is very net and his kind are liable to fall overboard.
Geo. W. Sanborn has a hundred dollar type writer in his new office that is a beauty. He is agent for the Union Fire Marine, the Royal, the Norwich Union and Lancashire Fire insurance companies.
The *Tillie E. Starbuck* comes down with 60,574 cents wheat. She takes on 590 tons more and goes to Queenstown on Monday. She is the first flat rigged sailing vessel built of iron in this country.

There was a largely attended meeting at the Columbia cannery at four o'clock yesterday afternoon. No definite action was taken nor any resolutions adopted. Large crowds of men went up toward Tongue point later in the afternoon.
A social business and social meeting of Astoria Lodge No. 43, I. O. O. F., will be held on Monday evening, the 18th inst., at the lodge room. Every member is expected to be present as matters of vital importance to the lodge will be discussed.
The seven men arrested at upper Astoria last Wednesday afternoon, were brought before Justice Goodell yesterday morning given a preliminary examination and held in the sum of \$100 each to appear before the grand jury which meets next week.
About midnight on Wednesday, a man named Ericson had a narrow escape from drowning by falling overboard between the Olympic saloon and the New York Novelty store. Cabin passage is the best such slippery weather as the present, for the lower decks are out of repair.

A meeting of the Albany fire department was held last Monday evening. It was decided to attend the state firemen's association and tournament at Astoria, and to send as many competing teams as convenient. It was also decided to accept the O. & C. railway's offer and leave there Tuesday morning, being met at East Portland by the steamer *Telegraph*.
P. M. Linguist, an old and respected citizen of Knappa, died at that place yesterday morning. Deceased was a member of Temple Lodge No. 7, A. F. and A. M., and Astor Lodge No. 6, K. of P. The funeral will take place at Knappa this morning. The *Clara Parker* leaves Main street wharf at nine sharp, with members of both lodges and such friends and acquaintances of the deceased as may wish to attend.

It is a capping machine to run on the tops of the filled tins, trim and crop them and complete the whole business in a style hitherto attainable only by hand. The Astoria Iron Works have just finished one which was on exhibition at J. O. Hanthorn's cannery yesterday. When the machine is feeling real good it will crop 100 cans a minute and can be run at a speed that will dispose of 120 cans in the same time.

NORTHWEST NOTES.

Portland rents are being reduced.
The *Oregonian* is printed on homemade paper.
Potatoes are fifteen cents a bushel on the Snoqualmie.
Prisoners cut their way out of the Seattle jail with a jack-knife.
There is said to be nearly 50,000 mutton sheep in Grant county.
Strawberries are five cents a pound in Portland, eight cents here.
Thirty thousand dollars has been subscribed to build a road from Vancouver to Yakima.
Hay is in considerable demand on Gray's harbor. A number of sales have been made at \$12 per ton.
The Oregon Railway and Navigation company has declared a dividend of 15 per cent, payable June 1st.
The Norwegian bark *Cela*, with 37 spars and 50 M lumber sailed from Port Townsend for Arendal, Norway, on the 11th.
H. P. Isaacs, of Walla Walla, estimates that the country east of the Cascade mountains will have 200,000 tons of wheat for export this year.
A committee of eastern capitalists is expected at Spokane Falls shortly. They are said to be nearly understood that they have made a box bid, which was accepted.
Oregon's commissioner says that the Oregon exhibit at New Orleans, though small, is stunner, and is exhibiting forth the commendation of the examiners of other states.
Another lead rich in silver has been discovered four miles back of Colville, W. T. The ore found yields well, and the mine is said to be one of the best covered in the Chehalis district.
Bids for the construction of the Northern Pacific tunnel through the Cascades will be opened to-morrow. It will be two miles long, and except the Hoosac tunnel, the longest in the United States.
The O. R. & N. Co.'s steel steamer *Olympian* sailed from Tacoma at 1 P. M., Tuesday, for San Francisco to go into the dry dock there. She cleared from the custom house at Port Townsend at daylight Wednesday, and will reach Cape Flattery bound south at 11 A. M.
The old garrison buildings at The Dalles are going to decay, and by the ravages of time and human beings will soon be destroyed. They are historic relics, and several of the prominent army officers of the war were at one time stationed there. General Grant among them.
The women of Pierce county, W. T., can not complain of not having their full share of the privileges granted by the suffrage act, at the present term of court. The twenty-four persons impeached as petit jurors are all women, and out of the forty husbands for the grand jury, there are thirty women.
The American bark *Amethyst*, which in early days plied between Portland and the Sandwich Islands, is now engaged in trading in and out of San Francisco. The *Amethyst* was built at Boston, Mass., in 1822, and was deserted by her crew at San Francisco during the gold excitement of 1849. She has been repaired a few times and is yet staunch and serviceable, and a few years ago was engaged in trading along the coast of China.
McMinville was located on the donation claim of Thos. Owens, who sold his claim to S. Corzine in 1844 for a shot gun. The town was named in 1855 and it now has 1000 inhabitants. The aggregate wheat yield of Yamhill county for this year is estimated at 1,500,000 bushels. J. G. Baker was the first settler on the two Yamhills; and he was the first sheriff—holding the office four years under the provisional government, and two years under the succeeding territorial government. When ordered by the judge to take out the first jury for deliberation (there being no public buildings), he asked, "Where shall I take them?" "O," said the judge, "just stake out the foreman and I guess the others will stay around."
J. S. Carman writes as follows from Corvallis to a friend in Portland: "All freight and passenger trains have been discontinued on the Oregon Pacific until further notice. Many attempts were made to wreck the trains, and the company thinks it is justified in taking this step to insure itself from damage suits, arising from persons being injured by train wrecks, etc. It was the intention to run trains each way as far as the burned tunnel, and there transfer passengers, baggage, etc., until the tunnel could be rebuilt, and the objection of law defyers in obstructing the track had made the risk to life and limb and the destruction of property too great. A reward of \$500 has been offered by the company for the arrest and conviction of the person or persons who set fire to the tunnel on the night of April 28th."

AN INCIDENT OF THE CIVIL WAR.

When the *Trent* affair occurred Thursday Weed was in London, having been sent there with others by this government to induce the queen to recognize our blockade of the southern ports, and he tells the following anecdote: All England was roused to indignation by the insult to her flag, and lead was the cry for war. For the first time since 1815 the navy yards were working double-quick night and day. On this side of the water public sentiment was in the same condition. The country was in arms anyway, the war spirit was rife, and the cry was that we would not give up Massachusetts and Rhode Island to the commissioners. Mr. Seward was cruelly endangered. Justice demanded the return of the prisoners. The American people demanded their retention. Luckily there was an ally, and as it was in winter, the draft of the dispatch to be sent to Mr. Seward demanding the release of the commissioners, to Windsor, Queen Victoria found fault with his wording, which was harsh, arrogant, and was pronounced. She took it into the room of the Prince Consort, then in his last illness, and asked his advice. He took a pen and though every exertion caused him the most exquisite pain, struck out the offending word, and the dispatch was forwarded to Lord Lyons for Mr. Seward's signature. The country demanded war. A dictatorial message would have brought it on, and with the south on our hands what would have been our fate had we gone to war with England? All honor to the noble woman who stood by us in the hour of our sorest need and by her timely sympathy and friendly services saved us from possible disruption.—*New York Courier, Chicago Tribune, May 3.*

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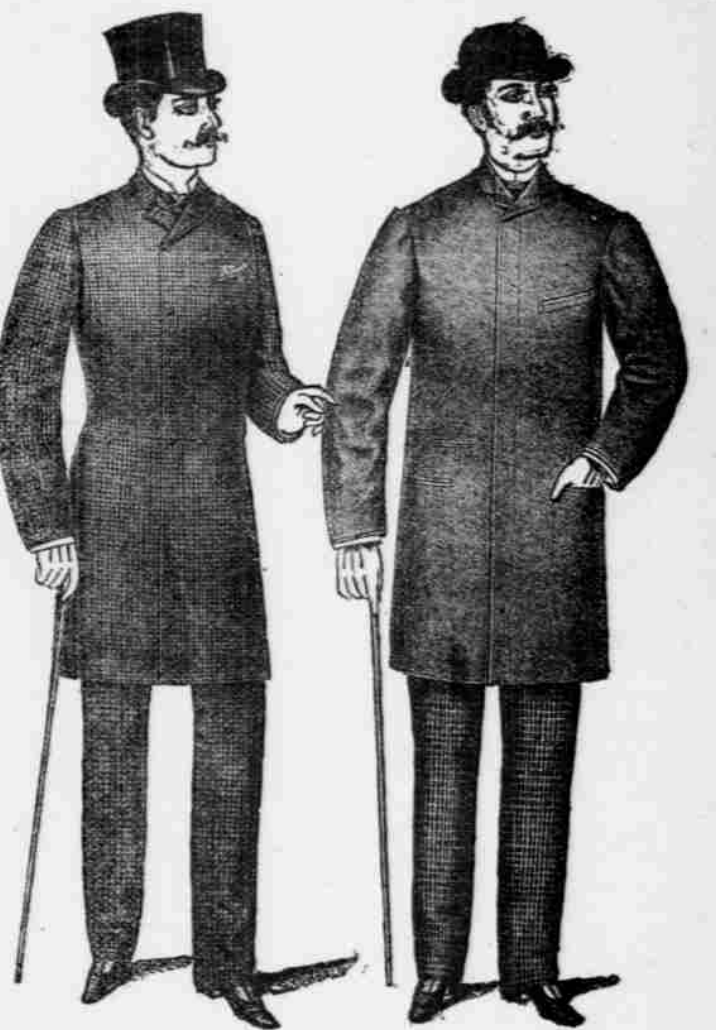
