THE "BOSS" DRUMMER.

EVERYBODY has met wide-awake, sharp-eyed men who have been everywhere, seen everything, know all about it whatever it is, and are ready for business at two in the morning or two in the afternoon. They are "drummers;" commercial travelers sent out to sell goods by sample, and are the pick of the lot—they must be sharp and, as is usually termed, "fly," or they'll "get left" by some keener competitor. A good many stories are told of their keenness, pertinacity and general display of cheek. The late Canadian rebellion where Biel and his forces were quelled by Gen. Middleton and his Canadian troops, furnishes a good illustration. A Gatling gun operated by a Capt. Howard with Middleton's forces, did deadly work in the ranks of the half breeds. Capt. Howard, the American who handled the Gatling gun for Middleton's forces, is, it appears, simply a plain, everyday commercial traveler for a Connecticut firm, showing off its goods. He wants to sell the Canadian government some Gatlings, and he proposed to make it clear that his horse puts perfectly reliable goods on the market. Other firms may sell guns that won't shoot, or, if they do shoot, won't hit anything. But he demonstrated not only that the Connecticut Gatling—none reliable without the firm name blown in the breech—would both shoot and hit. "You observe gentlemen" he may be presumed to have remarked as he rolled over a few half-breeds, "that her range is beautiful; that she doesn't waste powder; that she works easily and rapidly, and that she mows 'em! I'll venture to observe that no horse but ours can put such a gun on the market at the price. All warranted. Take a card." When the national drummers' association meets next fall we hope to see Capt. Howard elected to the presidency to succeed Millington. Capt. Howard is a credit to the profession. He knows how to show goods if any man does.

The era of Democratic simplicity has not fully returned. The president, in all his movements, evinces a desire to avoid mixing with the common herd, and takes every occasion to shun the people, save when absolutely obliged to meet them. It was announced, for instance, on Thursday, that he would leave for New York at 10 o'clock at night, and a small crowd gathered to see him, but he left at 4 o'clock, and he did not travel as other passengers do in an ordinary car. On the contrary, he, with Secretaries Whitney and Endicott, took a private car, the property of the vice-president of one of the "bloated railway monopolies." Democratic orators talk about.

SENATOR BLACKBURN, of Kentucky, is boiling mad about the cancellation of his brother's appointment as collector of internal revenue, and has withdrawn all his recommendations for other appointments and declared to Mr. Cleveland, "You can do as you d—d please." The spectacle of a statesman in anger is not pleasant; but when the wrath in such a case is accompanied by so complete and emphatic a concession of the president's right to freedom of action, it may be said to serve a wholesome purpose after all.

SENATOR VOORHEES says that Mr. Cleveland told him that he intended to remove every Republican officeholder of any prominence at the very earliest possible moment. "The president," said the senator, "assured me that not one of them would be left. The only delay now would simply be that which was absolutely necessary to secure good men to put in their places." There is to be a general change, and the bulk of these changes will come very soon.

QUELPAERT, which the English are said to have occupied, is an island twelve miles by forty-five, sixty miles off the Korean coast and commanding the entrance to the Yellow sea. As the Russians expect to take from China sundry provinces on the Yellow sea, they are perturbed at the prospect of an English naval station off its mouth.

Horse raising is a rapidly growing industry in Montana. The pasturage is excellent and the thin air increases the animals' lung capacity. Breeders are using finely bred stallions and they confidently expect that in a few years the blue grass region will have a formidable rival in the bunch grass plains.

A CLEVERMAN of St. Louis says that the aggregate church attendance in

that city on Sunday is 10,000, while on a recent Sunday 40,000 people witnessed a cow-boy exhibition, 20,000 attended baseball games, 20,000 spent the day in beer gardens and 5,000 heard Bob Ingersoll.

ALEXANDER III of Russia recently wrote, says the London Truth, to his sister, the duchess of Edinburgh, that he was as anxious for peace as she was, but that she must remember that he might have to choose between war and revolution.

The net debt of the United States has now gone below \$1,500,000,000 for the first time since the war. Twenty years ago it was \$2,700,000,000.

There have been received at Linlithgow Loch, in Scotland, 20,000 lake salmon eggs from the United States, for stock purposes.
