Should a second militia company be organized in Astoria we would have about our quota of state troops. On the 2nd of December, 1879, Gov. Thayer issued to Thos. Dealey a commission as captain of the Astoria Light Artillery, Co. B, First Regiment, Second Brigade, Oregon State Militia. The other officers were 1st Lieut., Geo. Lovett; 2nd Lieut., Chas. Young; 2nd Lieut., Jno. Nunney. This company is still in existence and only needs arms, uniforms, an armory and an armorer to be ready to meet the foe.

It is proposed in Pacific county to transplant Eastern oyster spawn or half-grown oysters, in Shoalwater bay and experiment on the probability of their flourishing there. It is said that twelve or fifteen years ago a Mr. Martz, of Bruceport, planted a few bushels of Eastern oysters a short distance southwest of Stony point, and about three years afterward there were quite a number of oysters taken from the vicinity about the size of a ten cent piece, and a few as large as a quarter. They were set on native shells, as there were plenty on the ground. They proved to be young oysters of the Eastern variety, as on opening they had a black spot on the center of the shell inside, which is peculiar to them and not to native oysters.

To-morrow evening the pupils of district No. 18 are going to have a public exhibition at Liberty Hall, and they will be glad to see their many friends and perform before them. They have taken hold and are trying to raise a little money for much needed books of reference, etc., and certainly deserve the encouragement of your presence. The little folks that to-day fill the air with merry laughter are the sober, thoughtful men and women of a few years to come. It seems to us but yesterday, "or scarce so long ago," since we all passed through that fleeting joyous period when the light of hope and buoyant future shone, and as then so now a little encouragement on the part of "grown-up folks" is always appreciated and treasured in the heart.

MAY SALMON SHIPMENTS.

Salmon shipments eastward by rail for the month of May were 50 tons 1 kit 4 lb 63 bbls salt, 12,780 cs Columbia river, and 950 cs shipped through from Tacoma. The 12,780 cases were sent as follows: To Chicago 4,375 cs, St. Louis 1,650, New Orleans 1,115, New York 1,150, Terra Haute 315, Cleveland 325, Omaha 340, Columbus 325, St. Paul 650, Minneapolis 325, Canton 325, Mansfield 325, Salt Lake 50, Atchison 375, Pittsburg 650, Kansas City 425. Individual shipments were as follows: Astoria Pier Co. 2,225, Buddell 200, Booth 2,925, Cutting 350, Coleman 1,475, J. Hume 600, Clatskanie 450, Meigs 325, Occident 1,500, Pillar Rock 340, Scandinavian 1,225, Socorro 340, River Pkg Co. 350, Warren 325, unspecified 50 cs.

The Oregonian notes that the Sacramento River Packing Co. are credited with shipping 200 cases. This is a new Columbia river brand, and seems to be quite a change from the old system of branding Sacramento as Columbia river fish.

Shipments to San Francisco for May aggregated 3,887 cs, ranking total shipment for the month 16,697 cs, against 21,541 cs for the same month last year.

11. And God said, let the earth put forth grass, herb yielding seed and fruit tree bearing fruit after its kind, wherein is the seed thereof, upon the earth; and it was so.

12. And the earth brought forth grass, herb yielding seed after its kind, and tree bearing fruit, wherein is the seed thereof after its kind; and God saw that it was good.

13. And there was evening and there was morning, a fourth day.

14. And God said, let there be light in the firmament of the heaven to divide the day from the night; and let them be for signs, and for seasons, and for days, and years.

15. And let them be for lights in the firmament of the heaven to give light upon the earth; and it was so.

16. And God made the two great lights; the greater light to rule the day, and the lesser light to rule the night; he made the stars also.

17. And God set them in the firmament of the heaven to give light upon the earth.

18. And to rule over the day and the night, and to divide the light from the darkness; and God saw that it was good.

19. And there was evening and there was morning, a fifth day.

20. And God said, Let the waters bring forth abundantly the moving creature that hath life, and let fowl fly above the earth in the open firmament of heaven.

21. And God created the great sea monsters, and every living creature that moveth, which the waters brought forth abundantly, after their kind, and every winged fowl after its kind; and God saw that it was good.

22. And God blessed them, saying, Be fruitful and multiply, and fill the waters in the seas, and let fowl multiply in the earth.

23. And there was evening and there was morning, a fifth day.

24. And God said: Let the earth bring forth the living creature after its kind, cattle, and creeping thing, and beast of the earth after its kind; and it was so.

25. And God made the beast of the earth after its kind, and the cattle after their kind, and everything that creepeth upon the ground after its kind; and God saw that it was good.

26. And God said: Let us make man in our image, after our likeness; and let them have dominion over the fish of the sea, and over the fowl of the air, and over the cattle, and over all the earth and over every creeping thing that creepeth upon the earth.

27. And God created man in his own image, in the image of God created he him; male and female created he them.

28. And God blessed them, and God said unto them, be fruitful and multiply and replenish the earth and subdue it, and have dominion over the fish of the sea, and over the fowl of the air, and over the cattle, and over all the earth and over every living thing that moveth upon the earth.

29. And God said, Behold I have given you every herb yielding seed, which is upon the face of all the earth, and every tree, in the which is the fruit of a tree yielding seed; to you it shall be for meat.

30. And to every beast of the earth, and to every fowl of the air, and to every thing that creepeth upon the earth, wherein there is life, I have given every green herb for meat; and it was so.

31. And God saw everything that he had made, and behold, it was very good. And there was evening and there was morning, the sixth day.

HIS MAIDEN EDITORIAL.

An up-country druggist, by a combination of circumstances, came into the possession of a newspaper, and here is his first attempt at editorial writing:

"As we were coming from our breakfast the other morning about 9 o'clock, a horse belonging to Mr. John Hogan our esteemed fellow-citizen with a blaze on his forehead and a white tail attached to a furniture car in which there was a piano that was routed by a well-known Prairie belle with rosewood cases became frightened and rushed wildly down the street where there were many people scattering alarm and distraction broadcast. On the corner of State and Indiana a child of Michael Bolivar Esq. our esteemed fellow-townsmen 3 years old was playing in the crowded thoroughfare. The Lewis River Mines.

LA CENTER, May 22, 1893.

Having just returned from the mines on the north fork of Lewis river, I will try to give you a correct account of the mines and their prospects, extent and richness. The mines are eight miles above the mouth of Spillahi creek. There are six or eight claims taken, and there are four men at work and they are making an average of \$2 per day with rock and sluice box. The claims which are being worked are the best which have been discovered. There are not as good prospects above or below as on these claims, but there will very likely be better diggings struck, as there are at present about 40 or 50 men engaged in prospecting, as they are not satisfied to work for one and two dollars per day, and that they can make anywhere along the river. I am satisfied parties need not go to these mines to make fortunes, as it is not there to be had. There has not been any gold-bearing quartz found yet, and all the claims which are taken are for sale. But this is a good place to rusticate in fine weather, and the best way to go is across Lewis river at the mouth of Spillahi creek. But I would not advise anyone to go to these mines if they have anything to do at home, as there are plenty of men there to thoroughly prospect the country, and they are determined and will not leave until it is done.
