A SENSIBLE SPEECH.

PORTLAND gave ex-Secretary Sherman and Chas. F. Adams, Jr. a reception the other day. Mr. Adams is at the head of the Union Pacific railway. In his speech replying to the oration tendered him he managed to say some very sensible things. Here is a portion of his remarks. They will strike the average man as being pretty solid: "The present policy of the Union Pacific Railroad company is essentially an unambitious one. It is meditating none of those great railroad surprises—the stretching out of iron bands to the west, to the north, to the south—which are so easy to conceive, so dangerous to execute, and so irresistibly attractive to the imaginative railroad mind. On the contrary, the policy of the present management is to endeavor, in so far as it can, to follow the example and live upon the precepts of that celebrated personage, commonly supposed to once have resided in Kentucky, who actually made a fortune by minding his own business. The Union Pacific is at this time steadily engaged in minding its own business. We are trying to fulfill our engagements to the national government; we are trying to live in peace with our neighbors; we are trying to develop our local resources, and deal fairly and liberally with the communities we serve; we are trying to get our affairs in order, to pay our debts and earn a living. These are all very commonplace, everyday things; yet these are the things which now, to the exclusion of all pleasant dreams of bonanza development, engage the attention of those who handle the affairs of the Union Pacific. Hence, I say, that the company is trying to make a fortune by minding its own business."

"But when I say this, the saying of it implies a good deal. For instance, it implies that the Union Pacific stands to-day, in its practical business management, wholly and absolutely divorced from the stock market. It is not operated with an eye to what is going on in Wall street. Whether the stock is up or down; whether bull or bear has the advantage in dealing with it, is wholly immaterial to us. The thing we look to is the volume of the business that is done, and the result of that business as shown in our monthly returns, which are known to the public as soon as they are known to us. These returns may not always be satisfactory—and the last one, I regret to say, was far from being satisfactory—nevertheless, they indicate, and they alone indicate, the degree of success which is attending the affairs of the company."

"And when I say that the company is trying to make its fortune by minding its own business, I mean also that it has no connection whatever which it can help with politics. We are common carriers, and it is immaterial to us who the people may elect to represent them in their legislatures, or who they may choose to carry out the law in the executive chambers, provided always that we are dealt with fairly, and left to carry on our business on business and not on political principles."

"On this head I might say a good deal were it either the time or place; but it seems to me to be neither the one or the other. What you unquestionably expect from me is something upon the relations which I have referred to as now existing, and the more immediate relations hereafter likely to exist, between you and the company I represent. Yet again as bearing upon this point, I can only repeat that the Union Pacific company, going ahead in an unambitious, quiet manner of fact fashion, proposes so far as it can to let the people of Oregon mind their own business in their own way, well satisfied that through their so doing will the Union Pacific derive for itself the largest possible benefits."

When a man talks in this way he commands confidence and respect, and in general his remarks apply equally as well to less important business than a great railroad company.

The appointment of such a man as Zach Montgomery to the important position of assistant attorney general must be pleasant to those holy men of *Harpers Weekly* and the *New York Times*, and other magnum journals, who helped make such appointments possible. Those folks think that the public schools are the great bulwark of American liberty; Zach thinks that they are a special device of the devil to lead souls astray. It must be pleasant to those folks to get a slap across the face from the hand that they supplied with power.

THE Chicago Mail remarks: "The prince of Wales has approved the new version of the old Testament, and has so informed the archbishop of Canterbury. The prince is not considered the highest authority on scriptural subjects. 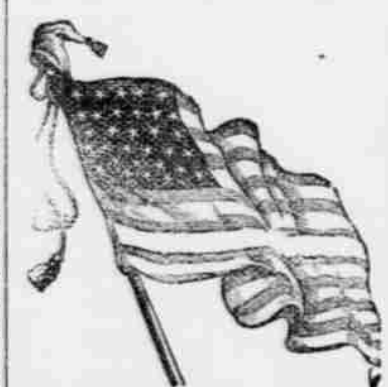
