THE Canadian Pacific has been completed to within ten miles of the summit of the Selkirks, and only seventy miles of the contract work of the Onderdonks remain to be finished. At present there are 5,000 men at work on the road, 1,000 having been sent out within the last ten days, and within a month 2,000 more will be forwarded. The line is now being operated to the first crossing of the Columbia river, a distance of 1,025 miles from Winnipeg.




