ENGLAND'S PRIME MINISTER.

The Marquis of Salisbury, who yesterday succeeded Gladstone as prime minister of the English cabinet, was born in Hatfield, England in 1830. He was educated at Eton and at Christ Church, Oxford, where he graduated, and was elected a fellow of All Soul's college 1853. In 1863 he was elected a member of parliament for Stamford, and he represented that borough in the conservative interest until his accession to the marquisate on the death of his father, April 12, 1868.

While in the lower house he was known as Lord Robert Cecil, until the decease of his elder brother, on June 24, 1865, when he assumed the courtesy title of Viscount Cranborne. In 1867 he married Georgiana Caroline, daughter of Sir Edward Hall Alderson, Baron of the Exchequer, and also of the celebrated Mrs. Opie.

His lordship took an active part in all public measures which affected the interests of the established church, and in the leading church of England institutions, and he was a frequent contributor to the Quarterly Review and to other periodicals. In Lord Derby's third administration he was, in July, 1866, appointed secretary of state for India, which post he resigned on account of a difference in opinion respecting the reform bill March 2, 1867, when two other cabinet ministers—viz., Gen. Peel, war secretary, and Lord Carnarvon, colonial secretary, also gave in their resignations.

On November 12, 1869, he was elected chancellor of the university of Oxford, in succession to the late Earl of Derby. In 1871 he and Lord Cairnes, as arbitrators, conducted a long investigation into the complicated affairs of the London, Chatham and Dover railway company. His lordship was again appointed secretary of state for India when Mr. Disraeli returned to office in February, 1874. When, at the close of the war between Turkey and Servia, differences arose between the former power and Russia, the Marquis of Salisbury was sent as special ambassador to the sublime Porte, and he and Sir Henry Elliot acted as joint plenipotentiaries of Great Britain at the conference of Constantinople. His lordship left England, November 8, 1876, and en route visited Paris, Berlin, Vienna and Rome. The progress toward agreement made at the preliminary meetings held at the Russian embassy in Constantinople, were brought to a successful conclusion at a formal conference, at which the joint proposals of the powers were pressed upon the same, was opened December 23d. At the time the new constitution of the Ottoman empire was in the hands of the Sultan, and on their return to London they met with a most enthusiastic reception at Charing Cross, July 16, 1878. The queen invested the marquis of Salisbury with the order of the Garter July 30th. On August 2d, he and the earl of Beaconsfield received the freedom of the city of London, and were afterward entertained at a grand banquet at the Mansion House. He went out of office with his party after the defeat at the general election in April, 1880. At a meeting of the conservative peers, held on May 9th, 1881, at the residence of the marquis of Abercromby, the marquis of Salisbury was elected to lead the party in the house of lords.

LANGUAGE OF THE VOICE.

Nothing betrays so much as the voice, save, perhaps, the eyes, but they can be lowered, and so far their expression hidden.

In moments of emotion no skill can hide the fact of disturbed feeling, though a strong will and the habit of self-control may steady the voice when else it would be falling and tremulous. Certain voices on the nerves and set our teeth on edge, and others are just as calm as some are irritating, quieting, or like a composing draught.

A good voice, calm in tone, and musical in quality, is one of the essentials for a physician—the "bedside voice"—which is nothing if it is not sympathetic by constitution.

Whatsoever its original quality may be, the orator's voice bears the unmistakable stamp of art, and becomes artificiality as such it may be admirable—telling in a crowd, impressive in address, but overwhelming and chilling at home, partly because it is always conscious and never self-forgetting.

A speaker's voice, with its careful intonation and accurate accent, would be as much out of place beside a sick-bed as a broadened silk for the kitchen girl.

THE TEST OF THE OVEN. One of the first symptoms of failing brain power is an indistinct or confused utterance; no idiot has a clear or melodious voice; the harsh scream of mania is proverbial, and no person of prompt and decisive thought was ever known to hesitate and stutter.

He says: "I should be laughed at if I claimed to have found a sovereign remedy for seasickness. All that is needed is self-control; preserve that for five minutes and you are saved. With the first approach of the enemy there comes in either a tracing up of nerves and muscles against him. Now that is exactly what he must not do, and he must do the exact contrary. When the first symptoms are felt, undo everything that confines the waist; do not lie down, but remain quickly seated and let your whole frame and structure respond easily and freely to the motion of the vessel, even adding swing and sway by your own effort.
