When Sheriff Jordan of Multnomab telegraphed Chief Engineer Charters the other day that the Fourth of July committee would offer a prize of \$250 to the winning team in a proposed hose race, wet test, First Assistant J. E. Thomas telegraphed that Rescues would come, Mr. Charters being confined to his house by sickness. Rescues wrote stating their desire to meet any of the teams belonging to the association in friendly contest, and yesterday afternoon Frank Parker received a letter from Sheriff Jordan, who is evidently desirous of having a match, and whose love of fair play made many warm friends for him in Astoria during the tournament. He says, how-ever, that he doesn't think that there can be any race, as there does not seem to be any disposition on the part of the valley teams to stand in, and of course if there's only one team to run there could be no contest. It appears that the Salem boys are not on deck to any alarming ex-

tent and will not compete.

The British bark Western Belle, from Sydney, New South Wales, for Wilmington was abandoned by her crew in latitude 5 north, longitude 124 west. The entire crew were picked up by Captain Howard of the Bolivian bark Remijo, who landed them at Levuka, in the Fiji islands. Captain Howard also rescued the centrain and twelve of the grew of the the captain and twelve of the crew of the brig Nightingale of Auckland, after they had been in an open boat for six days, living on biscuit and water, having left their vessel in a water logged condition from the effects of a gale encountered on the 18th of April. The Remijin sailed from Newcastle on the 21st of April, and encountered the unfortunate mariners three days afterward.

The steam collier Umatilla is in the San Francisco dry dock undergoing repairs. The Umatilla is the steamer which struck on the rocks off Cape Flattery in January, 84, and was towed in a leaking condition by the steamer Barnard Castle to Victoria, where she filled and sank in deep water. The contract for raising the Umatilla was awarded to Captain Whitelaw, who took it for about \$70,000, and he successfully accomplished the job. The Umatilla will be returned to her old route—coal carrying between San Francisco and Seattle.
