The Iowa editors are dead set for prohibition and dead set against woman suffrage.

The census returns of Washington territory show an increase of over one hundred per cent. in population during the past six years.

It is said that some 35,000 physicians are needed in European Russia alone. The Medical Times thinks we could spare that number without seriously crippling our scientific resources.

The tin market is greatly excited over the corner engineered by A. Strauss of London, who has gained possession of 5,000 of the 6,000 London "straits" tin now on the London market. There is said a large "short" interest exists. The price of tin has advanced 19 in London within a week.

Harpers Weekly opposed Blaine because he wouldn't give the Harpers his book to publish. Now it gets advertisements for supplies for Indian agencies, something a picture paper never got before. The last advertisement for Indian supplies in Harpers cost the government \$340. This is a small service to Blaine.

In another column is given the views of a practical dairyman, a visitor from Iowa, who sees the folly of trying to raise wheat, of total dependence on one crop and the great wealth that our soil and climate makes possible in the intelligent prosecution of the dairy business. The force of the Iowa man's remarks lies in their personal application.

The Seattle Post-Intelligencer, discussing a ridiculous system of assessment, makes a good point when it says: "So far as can be seen nothing is gained to the city by its low assessment. One-half has been taken from the assessment roll only to be added to the tax rate. In other words, \$50,000 of tax money was exacted last year from over \$8,000,000 of property. This year \$50,000 will be exacted from \$5,000,000. The change is disadvantageous to us as a city, and of not one dollar of benefit to us as citizens."

There is an interesting story says the Oregonian in circulation to the effect that Mr. Elijah Smith's re-election to the presidency of the Oregon Railway and Navigation company just saved the lease. It is said that Mr. Bratton Ives, who failed in the contest, was the representative of the Chas. B. Wright interest, and that the thing had been "set up" against the lease and in the interest of Tacoma, which Mr. Wright is anxious to build up. So confident was Mr. Ives of success that he printed in the Philadelphia Record a list of the prospective directors in which only Mr. Endicott of the old board was to have a place. This came under the eye of Mr. Smith who "dropped on the little game" at once and came out by special train on the double-track, reaching here just in time to defeat Mr. Ives' plans. We give this simply as a matter of current gossip which may or may not be wholly true.

"Our political delusion" is the subject of a valuable and suggestive article in the Atlantic to hand. The delusion consists in supposing that a change of presidents is a change of policies. The writer asserts that the election of a president determines little more than whether one or the other of the principal candidates shall control the appointments to office. He fixes the responsibility for legislation upon the speaker of congress and the chairman of committees which he appoints. No other person, he says, can so impress his personal views on legislation as can he. He can appoint to the committees which have special charge of legislation on important subjects a majority of men who agree with his views, and those committees can practically exercise entire control of the matter. This is also exemplified by the history of the last session. The speaker had appointed to the coinage committee a majority of members hostile to the suspension of silver coinage; and so, in spite of the impending business crisis, nothing affecting the subject was reported. Yet the subject was, indeed, brought up at the close of the session, but only by a parliamentary device founded on the fact that the purchase of silver bullion by the treasury was a question of appropriations, and a provision could therefore be tacked on to the bills of another committee than that of coinage. In fact, the speaker who makes up the committees is the only single person of any real importance in the legislative branch of our government.
