PROSPERITY FOR TEN CENTS—PERHAPS.

Those who are suffering from "hard times"—and most of the American people count themselves to-day in that category—will be glad to know that they are suffering needlessly. In a little pamphlet of less than fifty pages, entitled "Hard Times and how to mend them," D. H. Goudie, of Chicago, shows "how the national government could, by very simple expedients costing the country nothing, find work and wages for the mechanic, trade for the merchant, food for the hungry, clothes for the ragged and prosperity for all." He goes still further and shows "how the man who is earning only the wages of the unskilled laborer may become independent; how the rich may increase their bodily health and mental vigor; how all may live well on half the money usually spent; how they may improve their health and spirits and increase their chances for a long and happy life."

This is an attractive programme and exceedingly cheap at the price, which is only ten cents. If relief can be afforded for that insignificant sum from the ills which oppress us the cloud should be lifted at once, that the sunlight of prosperity may again pour in and irradiate the face of the country. There is reason to fear, however, that the cloud is not to be immediately lifted according to programme.

The suggestions for individual effort in the removal of hard times are excellent, though not new. They are embodied substantially in the two words, frugality and economy, and the admonition, "live within your means."

The art of supporting a family in comfort and happiness on nine dollars a week is admirably set forth, and many a family would profit to the extent of ten times ten cents by a careful consideration of the lesson.

But when we come to the government side of the question the problem becomes more difficult. The "very simple expedients, costing the country nothing," are simple certainly, but they will scarcely commend themselves to the intelligent people of the country. The first expedient—based on the very just assumption that hard times are caused by overproduction and will mend when consumption overtakes the supply—is that the government shall "step in and destroy the pernicious surplus which is clogging the wheels of trade and commerce." This might involve the purchase of the surplus, but in the estimate of the proposer that also can simply be effected by "printing a certain number of bits of paper and stamping them legal tender." "Is there a merchant, manufacturer, farmer or mechanic in the Union," he asks with fine scorn "who would refuse to receive them at their face value? Certainly, no one but a fool would think of doing so! How much then would the people have paid for the expedient by which the hard times had been removed, and commerce and prosperity restored to the nation? Only the expense of printing and signing the notes, and as we could pay for that in the notes themselves, it would not have cost us a single cent; nay, more, we would be richer by \$300,000,000 dollars which would go on day by day, reproducing themselves in a thousand forms of solid and useful productions. This is the great beauty of a currency—it is never idle—nor one person in a thousand is fool enough to hide it away in a corner, it must be kept in motion and every move it makes it adds to the world's wealth or pleasure. It is utterly unlike any other form of wealth; practically speaking it never loses in value, while all other kinds of riches waste and go to decay."

In its last analysis, therefore, the scheme turns out to be simply inflation, and an endless infliction of irredeemable currency. Whatever charms such a plan might have for an inexperienced nation, the United States is not likely again to embark in it. "The burnt child dreads the fire."

A teacher in one of the Altona schools recently electrified her pupils who were annoying her with questions: "Children, I am engaged. Noticing the general look of astonishment she added: "But not to any fool of a man," and the excitement died away.
