LOW INTEREST RATES.

The bank of England is advertising money to loan at 2 per cent, the lowest figure ever named by that bank. Money is a drug all over the world. It suffers alike with the abundance which crowds other fields. It is one of the anomalies of political economy that cheap money and cheap produce should go together. There is a surfeit all round. Money is being loaned out on call in New York to-day at 1 per cent per annum. The statement hardly admits of belief, and yet the information is from an authentic source. In times of speculation, money has commanded as high as 1 per cent per diem for call loans. Such a condition may occur again within a few months. Chicago brokers report money at 4 to 7 per cent, though they admit that loans are made on government securities at less than 4. There is probably a good deal of money out on call in various American cities at 1 to 3 per cent. Holders of idle capital evidently prefer even these rates than to speculate in produce or stocks. If money did not escape taxation in some cases, it would be an unprofitable asset to have at times, as taxes vary from 2 to 3 per cent. The current low prices of produce ought to stimulate a more active employment of money, and they undoubtedly would if any considerable number of capitalists believed that these lines of produce could not be duplicated very soon at present selling rates. It is the want of confidence in any permanent appreciation in values that hangs like a mill-stone over financial affairs.

An executive notice has been issued from the state department at Washington, announcing that a temporary diplomatic agreement has been entered into between the government of the United States and the government of her Britannic majesty, in relation to fishing privileges which were granted by the fishing clauses of the treaty between the United States and Great Britain of May, 1871, whereby the privilege of fishing, which would otherwise have terminated with the treaty clauses on the 1st of July prox., may be enjoyed by citizens and subjects of the two countries engaged in fishing operations throughout the season of 1883. This agreement proceeds from the mutual good will of the two governments, and has been reached solely to avoid all misunderstanding and difficulties which might otherwise arise from the abrupt termination of fishing in the midst of the season. The immunity which is accorded by this agreement to vessels belonging to citizens of the United States engaged in fishing in British-American waters will likewise be extended to British vessels and subjects engaged in fishing in waters of the United States. The present temporary agreement in no way affects the question of statutory enactment or exemption from customs duties. As a part of this agreement the president will bring the whole question of fisheries before congress at its next session in December, and recommend the appointment of a joint commission by the government of the United States and Great Britain to consider the matter, and in the interests of maintaining neighborly and friendly intercourse between the two countries, and for advancing the development and extension of trade between the United States and British North America.

"I AM BY NO MEANS satisfied," said a Wyoming judge in sentencing a prisoner recently, "with the evidence in the case, and am not sure whether you killed John Forbes or whether he died by a visitation of God, but my sentence is that you be hanged on the third Friday of June; and should you know of your own innocence you will have the comforting thought that it is doubted by some of the wisest thinkers of the age whether life is in any circumstances worth living." What such a judge would do in a case where he was really convinced of a prisoner's guilt, it is difficult to surmise.

It is estimated that 4,000 Dames will come to this country this year, most of whom will settle in the northwest. Most of the immigrants from Denmark are farmers in good circumstances. The majority own farms, and when they come to this country they bring considerable money with them.

No man can tell how a jury will flop. Two liquor cases were tried in Marshalltown, Iowa, the other day, in which the evidence was exactly the same. One of the accused was fined \$75, and the other was acquitted.
