**ANECDOTES OF MEN.**

**Thad. Stevens a Gambler.**  
[Ben Perley wrote in Boston Budget.]  
Thad Stevens was an inveterate gambler. One who had met him in the haunts of "the tiger," describes him as having played for excitement, not caring whether he won or lost. Like Fox, who described winning at hazard as the greatest pleasure in life, and losing at the same game as the next greatest, Stevens lost or won with the same apparent indifference. He played with consummate coolness, never lost his temper, and never increased the amount of his bet either to retrieve his losses or more rapidly increase his winnings. His sarcastic remarks upon the discomposure of his fellow-players, who sometimes exclaimed with rage and profanity at their ill-luck, were always witty as well as cutting. While they were eating and drinking with the voracity of oromphants, he never indulged in anything more stimulating than a cracker and a sip of water. The contrast between his coolness and apparent apathy and the eager, fierce excitement of others sitting at the same table and engaged in the same pursuit was amazing.

**A Story of Beecher.**  
It is said of Henry Ward Beecher by one who speaks authentically that he is very fond of precious stones—not the big diamonds that actresses are fond of displaying, but unset pearls, rubies, sapphires, emeralds and amethysts. His delight is to gather the loose gems up in his hands and look at them. His collection of gems, while not large, includes some very pretty and costly ones. One day Miss Ellen Terry paid him a visit. He was delighted, and exerted himself to entertain the renowned actress. He succeeded in a marked degree, and when she arose to depart she made some pretty little speech about an oasis in the desert of her memory which would ever be green when thinking of the visit. Not to be outdone in gallantry, the divine got down his box of gems and showed them to her. He ran his fingers through them.  
"Select one," he said. "It will make the oasis bright as well as green."  
She spoke of their value, and objected on that account. He still insisted that she should take one, so finally she selected an elegant cat's-eye gem, which she bore away as a souvenir of the Plymouth Church pastor.

**"Old Hickory."**  
Gen. Jackson was known by the soldiers who had served under him as "Old Hickory," a sobriquet given him during the Creek war. His brigade was making a forced march, without baggage or tents, to surprise the Indians in one of their villages, and were for several days and nights exposed to the peltings of a March storm, the rain freezing as it fell. Gen. Jackson got a severe cold, but did not complain, as he tried to sleep in a muddy bottom among his half-frozen soldiers. Capt. Allen and his brother John down a stout hickory tree, peeled off the bark and made a covering for the General, who was with difficulty persuaded to crawl into it. The next morning a drunken citizen entered the camp, and seeing the tent, kicked it over. As Jackson crawled from the ruins the toper cried: "Hello, Old Hickory, come out of your bark and pine us in a drink!" Thereupon the General was known in camp as "Old Hickory," and when he was talked of as a Presidential candidate the nickname was adopted by his supporters. The "liberty tree" of the Revolution was revived in the "hickory tree," planted at every country cross roads and village by the enthusiastic Democrats, while they sang:  
Freemen, cheer the hickory tree,  
Long its boughs have sheltered thee.  
**Grant's Last Speech.**  
What is believed to have been Grant's last public speech was made at a meeting of the chaplains of the northern and southern armies held at Ocean Grove, N. J., in August last. At the gathering in the great auditorium, Rev. A. J. Palmer, of New York, who enlisted at the age of 14 and served all through the war, made an address of welcome, closing as follows: "The man inflexible in peace, invincible in war, calm in defeat, magnanimous in victory—such a man I say can never be belittled or disgraced by the sharks or the sharpers of Wall street." When the cheers, which continued for more than five minutes, at last subsided, Gen. Grant came forward, and resting painfully on his crutch said in a low voice, which, however, could be heard distinctly in the death-like hush: "An hour ago I might have made a speech, but now I am almost afraid to try. I know, as few can, the good these chaplains have done. Think of the consolation they have given to the sick and dying; think of the last messages of the boys in the field; they have sent to anxious, sorrowing mothers and fathers at home! I have not words to express my thanks for this welcome. I appreciate it." The sentence was never finished. Tears stood in the general's eyes, and he dropped back into his seat with a suppressed sob. This is believed to be Gen. Grant's last formal appearance in public. He was driven back that night to his cottage at Long Branch.

The Oregon Pacific Railroad company proposes to pay 15 per cent of all claims exceeding \$100, and 20 per cent of those less than \$100; company to give its notes for balance, payable in four months from date, with 6 per cent per annum from date. The company further agrees to deposit with Hamilton, Job & Co., bankers in Corvallis, as collateral to secure payment of said notes, the company's first mortgage bonds to the amount of \$1,500 on each \$1,000 indebtedness. It is believed that within a week this compromise will be effected, and trains will commence running again.

The following assignment is made for the payment of troops in the department of the Columbia on the muster rolls of June 30th: Lieutenant Colonel Rodney C. Smith, at Forts Canby and Townsend; Major J. P. Canby, at Forts Coeur d'Alene and Fort Klamath. The officers will return to their usual stations after their work is done.
