THE PATHWAY TO SUCCESS.

A YOUNG man in the city of New York had been several years attempting to build up a law practice; he had as light acquaintance in the city, he was not naturally of a very social nature, and he had very little faculty of bringing himself to the notice of influential men. The work that had come to him had been done faithfully, but the stream was a shallow one, and seemed as likely to dry up as to deepen. The young lawyer became discouraged, and began to question whether he had not made a mistake in choosing a profession, and even to fear that his life would be a failure. Just at this time a friend, also a lawyer, who was going into the country for the summer, invited him to occupy the house which his family were about to leave. Glad to have more commodious quarters at a reduced expense, he accepted the invitation, and found among his friend's possessions a large and valuable law library. It so happened that he had in his hands at this time a case on appeal to one of the higher courts; he had nothing else to do, and the library was close at hand, and he spent the summer in a study of the case so thorough and painstaking that he mastered the whole history of jurisprudence bearing upon it. He expected very little profit from it, but he had the satisfaction of doing a piece of work artistically and ideally well.

Autumn came in due time, and with it the argument of the case in question. It is a common saying among lawyers that cases are often won in the office than in the court-room. The young lawyer showed himself a thorough master of his case, and presented it with such clearness, simplicity, and vigor that he held the attention of the judges to the very close. One of these judges had already decided to leave the bench and return to general practice; the argument of the young man arrested his attention, and resulted in a letter suggesting an interview. That summer's work bore fruit in a partnership in a leading law firm and in a practice which is to-day amongst the most lucrative and influential in the city.

This bit of history from actual life, is repeated here as an illustration of a fact, which men are apt to forget in their moments of discouragement, that every life has its opportunity. At some time along the road, very likely at its hardest and dreariest point, success stands with outstretched hand. She is rarely discerned at the moment, but the man who uses every opportunity as if it were the great opportunity of his life is sure not to miss the crown when it is offered because its jewels are covered. Life is full of vicissitudes, changes and discouragements; it is also full of rewards, prizes, and opportunities. These come often at the end of a long course of discipline and patience, but to every true worker in one form or another they do come at last. It is a battle in which there is no final defeat to those who strive lawfully; a race in which no wreaths are lost to those who run faithfully.

If you are at the point of discouragement, and are beginning to lose heart, think of the host of men who have plucked success out of the jaws of failure. Your hour of triumph will come in due time; work and wait.

GAIL HAMILTON AND NEAL DOW.

GAIL HAMILTON searches the prohibitionists mercilessly in her glance at the late Presidential contest given in the *North American Review*. Her close relations to Blaine as a cousin of his wife and a member of his household, will naturally create the inference that she says what Blaine thinks; but it should be remembered that Gail Hamilton is a woman with a mind and a will of her own.

While Gail Hamilton is walloping the prohibitionists without stint because they defeated Blaine, Neal Dow, the father of the prohibition movement, in his lectures declares that the Republican leaders proposed, just before the last presidential election, to favor prohibition if the prohibitionists would aid Blaine in Maine, and that the leaders referred to broke every promise made, and forced the prohibitionists to maintain a separate national organization in politics.

As both Neal Dow and Gail Hamilton come from Maine, and as both agreed upon the prohibition policy that carried Maine largely for the Republicans in that state last September, they would do well to get together and compare notes as to the future relation of Republicanism and prohibition in politics.

As they are prancing around now, it is evident that there will be something of a Jonah and the whale story

over again, unless the belligerents can be mellowed down.

The commissioner of the general land office has refused the request of the Oregon and California railway company for the issue of patents on 325,000 acres of land already selected by the company and to allow selections to be made from a million acres more, under the lapsed land grant to that company in this state. The grant expired last year and bills declaring forfeiture of the grant were before congress at the last session. The commissioner says that until the matter of enforcing forfeiture has been determined by congress or the courts it is his opinion that he should take no steps which would place it beyond the power of the legislative branch to protect public rights in the premises.

The London correspondent of the *Kolnische Zeitung* writes that he has the best authority for the statement that De Stael, Russian ambassador at London, is not instructed to ask Salisbury to explain his recent utterances in the house of lords, concerning Russia. Russia prefers to pass the incident in silence.

SOMETHING NEW.
Mining Claims, with All their Dips, Spurs, Angles and Slopes.

There seems to be a Divine law of compensation running through the course of things here below, on the surface or ground floor, as it were that keeps the balance even. Just at present land office notices are scarce than hen's teeth and applications for timber land have grown so infrequent that the county clerk would hardly recognize one were it brought into him.

But as a sort of compensation a new industry has broken out and if it doesn't break up or break down may relieve the tedium of a dull summer. It is the location of

MINING CLAIMS IN CLATSOP COUNTY.
The forms differ: a good deal. Over in Nevada there was always a mass of glittering generalities run in that made the document decidedly imposing and made fat fees for the recorder and the newspaper; it usually cost a man about \$13 to get his claim recorded and an application for a patent cost \$25 for publication and the remainder of the \$50 went for spirituous and exhilarating beverages that added to the general joviousness and completed the harmony of the occasion. It didn't make any particular difference in that country where or what you located; it was all good, only some locations were more profitable than others. The main point was to hold your location after people began to find out that it was worth having. Sometimes it took considerable coin to hold it in a manner satisfactory to the locator. Two men at night and two men in the day, each having a good shot gun and drawing a salary of ten dollars a day were about as good evidence of title as was ordinarily furnished and this style has in its day prevented considerable litigation which would have been just as expensive and a good deal more troublesome and provocative.

But it is to be hoped that any of the fifteen prospectors who have recorded their claims at the county clerk's office will not have any serious trouble in holding these claims of *eternis* or otherwise. Following is about the general style and tenor of these claims, being a verbatim copy of the first gold mining claim ever recorded in Clatsop county.

"Notice. The undersigned a citizen of the United States, having complied with the law does hereby locate a claim for mining purposes under the mining laws of the United States, fifteen hundred feet of this Oregon lode bearing gold, silver and other valuable minerals, bounded and described as follows, viz: commencing at a red fir tree five feet in diameter marked G, No. 1, and running in a northerly course along the vein fifteen hundred feet to a hemlock tree three and a half feet in diameter, marked G, No. 2, with surface ground; three hundred feet on each side of the vein, the whole forming a parallelogram fifteen hundred feet in length by six hundred feet in width and all being on Rock Creek in Clatsop county, Oregon, in an unsurveyed mining district and on unsurveyed land and shall be known as the Gertrude claim location.
