PIRATE LAFITTE.
The Exploits of a Celebrated Dare-Devil and His Gang.

They were sea-dare-devils, those old buccanniers, who sailed about among the West India islands, through the bright waters of the Gulf of Mexico and along the Atlantic sea coast. They thought nothing of going up the deeper rivers to the plantations of rice and indigo, and, after loading their vessels, would pillage and burn the residences, then depart, leaving the poor planters to deplore the ruin of their homesteads and also very dangerous to go by sea from southern ports to New York, as was shown by the case of Mrs. Alston. She was Theodora, the only daughter of the distinguished Aaron Burr, a lovely and accomplished woman, who married Governor Alston of South Carolina. When her father was to be tried for high treason, Mrs. Alston gathered up all the handsome family silver plate, and with her husband's consent, set off in a ship for New York, where it was to be sold for her father's benefit. But neither vessel nor lady was ever heard of again, and as there was no storm to have occasioned disaster, the pirates were always supposed to have captured and destroyed them. Governor Alston offered large rewards for information, but no tidings of Mrs. Alston's fate ever reached him, and it was only many years after that one of the miscreants made a dying confession and admitted the facts, stating that he had ever been hunted by the remembrance of the crime. The pirates had had spies in Charleston, who notified them of the sailing of the ship with the valuable silverware aboard; they had laid in wait for her, taken possession of her on the high seas, and made the unfortunate passengers and crew "walk the plank." Mrs. Alston had refused to have her eyes blindfolded; with the most heroic courage and composure, all dressed in white, her beautiful face raised to heaven and the Bible clasped to her heart, she bravely stepped forward into eternity.

Another story, which dates still further back into the past is the fate of Steed Bonnet, a desperate robber. His depredations and interruptions to commerce, made him a terror to the coast of Carolina, until at length Governor Sir Nathaniel Johnson fitted out a sloop-of-war and sent Colonel William Rhett in pursuit of him. They met him at the mouth of Cape Fear river, where an engagement took place. The pirate's ship was boarded and captured, and he, and those of his crew who remained alive, were taken to Charleston, where they were tried and condemned. So one pleasant, sunny morning in November, 1718, Steed Bonnet and thirty-two of his men were hanged at White Point Garden. This public garden forms the southern point of Charleston, at the confluence of the Ashley and Cooper rivers, and has been called the Battery ever since the revolutionary war, when an earthwork was erected there, and cannon mounted, which were expected to drive back the British if they succeeded in passing Fort Moultrie. Most happily, however, they were never called into action, as the English were defeated.

The last of the buccanniers was the celebrated Lafitte, who for many years carried on his illicit traffic in defiance of the government. His crew of smugglers and pirates occupied the bay of Barataria, where they had fortified an island. A price was set upon his head, but it is said that he was frequently seen in New Orleans, and had friends, and even a banker who received his ill-gotten gains "under the rose." There are so many lakes and bayous along the coast of Louisiana and Mississippi that the light, swift crafts of the pirates could always elude pursuit and slip away into some inlet or behind an island, when they found an enemy on their track. All the Spanish fishermen, who were inimical to the United States, were in their pay, and gave notice by private signals when there was danger to be apprehended, and so they enjoyed comparative immunity from the consequences of their misdeeds.

This daring robber deserves our praise for his patriotism, however, for when the English came to attack New Orleans, in 1815, Sir Edward Pakenham, the commander of their forces, Lafitte a big reward if he would assist his army by showing them the passes to the city, which none knew so well as this skillful pilot. But Lafitte refused his bribe and sent word to General Jackson that if he would insure his men a free pardon for past offenses they would come up and help him to defend the city. As they were known to have bold hearts, and to be skillful artillerymen, Governor Claiborne willingly granted this request, and so Lafitte, his men and his guns arrived and did good service in the day of our necessity.

In New York last Tuesday the jury acquitted Mrs. Dudley, who shot O'Donovan Rossa, on the ground of insanity. The jury was only in consultation about five minutes when they rendered their verdict. A motion was made to send Mrs. Dudley to the state lunatic asylum, which her counsel opposed. The latter asked that their client be permitted to be returned to her native country, and be placed in an institution there. The courts will listen to arguments on this motion to-day.

EUROPEAN TOPICS.

LONDON, June 30.—The death of Emperor William promises to be the next great sensation in Europe. Extraordinary precautions are being taken to prevent the sending of any telegram revealing his real condition, but private letters not subject to official censorship give such discouraging forecasts that the news of his death is daily expected. In official circles in England the death of the aged Kaiser is looked upon as an event of the very near future, and the extent to which this occurrence is calculated upon seems surprising and heartless. Its immediate political effect will be to bind England and Germany together in very close union. The crown princess of England will be empress of Germany, and the coming emperor is known as an affectionate friend of the Prince of Wales and Queen Victoria.

Nothing more opportune for the new Tory government of England could possibly occur. With an Anglo-German alliance firmly established, difficulties in the way of England's foreign policies would disappear as if by magic, and the Salisbury ministry would get the credit of results wrought by a dispensation of providence. It is rumored that all this was counted upon in the very highest circles in the two realms before Lord Salisbury finally consented to take office, and that it very largely influenced his decision.

TOMBSTONE, June 30.—A. J. Hancock, a miner, brought news yesterday from Fronteras of an engagement between Indians and whites last Thursday, thirty miles southeast of Fronteras, in which it is reported that thirty-six Indians and sixteen Americans were killed and several wounded. To-day further information was received through Thomas Crocker, from San Bernardino ranch, situated on the trail from Fort Bowie to Sonora. He reports an engagement between the entire force under Lieutenant Davis and the Apaches. Sixteen Indians were killed and fifteen or twenty taken prisoner. The loss of the whites is not stated.

NEW YORK, July 1.—The Telegram's Washington special says: General Grant's brother-in-law said to-day: "I am afraid that General Grant will not last many more days. To-day I received information from the family that the cancer has commenced to inflame the jugular vein, and death is the question of a few days, in the opinion of his physicians."

Ready Riot in Mexico.
Foolish as it seems, the riot was all about some nickle coins which had recently been issued by the Mexican Government, and which the Mexicans disliked. A small cause, surely.
