**A STRANGE STORY.**  
Experience of a Californian as a Filibuster.

NEW ORLEANS, July 8.—Joseph M. Worrall tells a strange story. He says he came to see the exposition from California, where he had been a miner. He was told that he might join the Honduras mining expedition with profit to himself, and resolved upon going. He was introduced to Captain Martin and made application to go on the contemplated mining trip. He left here on the E. B. Ward, Jr., on May 26th. Captain Martin had told him that there would probably have to be some fighting done to obtain possession of the mine. Worrall says that he found some twenty other men on the steamer and all were comfortably provided for. Capt. Martin was not there. When two days out at sea E. James, who was at the head of the expedition, came to him and said that he was disappointed at Martin not being aboard. James said he had advanced Martin some \$800. James then told Worrall the real nature of the expedition. He said that Soto, the former president of Honduras, was desirous of regaining that position, and the expedition was formed for the purpose of aiding him. A steamer had been fitted out at New York for the same purpose, and the New Orleans expedition was to meet it at Ruanan. James told him that as he had been a military man, it was desired that he should take charge of sixteen men, and that he would leave Worrall and the men on the island with money, and it would be their mission to conciliate the natives and wait for a steamer, which would come in sight and fly a white pennant. That evening the arms were opened and distributed. Each man received a Colt's magazine rifle and one or two revolvers. Everything went on nicely and quietly until Saturday night, when the Ward anchored at Ruanan. On Sunday the party went ashore, and the custom house officers took their rifles and ammunition away, allowing them to retain their revolvers, which were useless without bullets. They remained at Ruanan all day Sunday, and asked James what was to be done. He told Worrall and two men to accompany him to Truxillo. James hired a sloop, and the party of four started. James said he would engage a schooner to take the rest of the men out to sea and there await the arrival of the New York steamer. James and the three others reached Truxillo the next Sunday. There they met Messrs. Lees, Johnson and Bector from Chicago. They were there with an abundance of money, and were hiring a schooner to go down the coast and engage in mining. When James explained the nature of the expedition which he headed, and the Chicago parties became frightened and abandoned their enterprise. Two or three days afterwards James and several friends rode off inland towards the capital. This was the last Worrall saw of him. Before leaving James gave him \$100 in the money of that country, and instructed him to look out for the expedition from New York. Worrall says he did not do this, but came back here. Lee and Johnson of Chicago came with him, but Froley missed the boat. On the day of their departure from Truxillo the place was excited over rumors that the Soto expedition had arrived at Ruanan. Barricades were erected and martial law was in sway. Mr. Worrall is from Los Angeles, Cal., and considers himself well out of the romantic scrape. The purser of the steamer E. B. Ward, Jr., vouches for the truthfulness of Worrall in the matter of the party on board with James, the distribution of arms, etc., and the landing of the party at Ruanan. The rest of the story he has heard, but does not know of his own knowledge.

**SUICIDE IN CORVALLIS.**  
On Thursday night, July 2nd, occurred a blood curdling affair in Corvallis that will long be remembered by that community. All parties connected with the tragedy are well known in Benton county. Mr. and Mrs. L. J. Kline, their son Moses and niece Pauline, went to E. Rosenthal's store at about 9 o'clock P. M., and locked the door behind them. The two women then proceeded to cowhide and otherwise beat Rosenthal, while the two men stood to prevent Rosenthal from defending himself. After finishing their work, he wrote a note, which was afterwards found, stating that "the Klines have robbed me and now have murdered me." The note requested Mr. L. Newgrass and Max Friendly to settle up his business and to give him a decent funeral. He then placed his revolver in his mouth and fired, the ball coming out of the top of his head and killing him instantly. When found he was lying in his bed on his back. It is stated by the gentleman who informed the Salem Statesman that trouble has been brewing between the Klines and Rosenthal for the last six months. There is much excitement about the matter, and in all probability the four have already been arrested.

**WE'RE SQUEEZING 'EM.**  
What a Southern Pacific Railway Official Says of Southern Oregon Possibilities and the Northern Pacific Competition.

Mr. Gage, who is now installed in his office as assistant president of the Southern Pacific company says: "There is an undeveloped country in northern California and southern Oregon, that has tremendous possibilities for future trade with San Francisco. The state wants immigrants of the right sort to settle that country, and I think immigration is coming in now as fast as it can be properly assimilated. San Francisco will regain all of its trade with Oregon and Washington territory as soon as rails are laid through from this city to Portland."  
"And when will that be?" asked the reporter.  
"Well, the connection could be made, I suppose, in two years after work on the California and Oregon is resumed."  
"And that will be?"  
"I am not prepared to answer that. The late state legislature asked congress to extend the time of those land grants up there for two years. We must see that congress does, and then we can tell better what the railroad will do."

The above conversation was held about four days prior to the receipt of news from New York that the Central Pacific railroad was preparing an issue of \$5,000,000 in bonds to complete the Oregon branch. The secret is said to have leaked out among the railroad officials recently assembled here, that it is the intention of the Central Pacific railroad company, when their bonds fall due, which were issued to them as means to raise funds for its construction, to throw up the "plant" to the government, to take place in a few years, when it will be worn to a "streak of rust and a right of way." The Central Pacific company has organized a corporation in Kentucky to lease all their roads and run them. "Among the causes which have contributed to the falling off in the through passenger traffic of the Southern Pacific company may be noticed the increase in the tourist travel over the Northern Pacific. In spite of the fact that the Northern Pacific receives a subsidy of \$500,000 a year for keeping out of the Southern Pacific company's territory and maintaining the arbitrary rate of \$20 on steamer tickets between this city and Portland, the cars of the northern road are daily filled with first-class passengers going east and west."
