LUMBERING ON PUGET SOUND.

The Tacoma News gives the following estimate, based upon reliable in-formation, of the daily output of logs at the various logging camps on Puget sound:

This amount, if correct as far as stated, would be considerably in-creased by numerous small operators not mentioned, and by the larger camps on Hood's Canal not reported. The mills on the Sound are now all running on full time, and have a daily capacity about as follows:

At present prices, and with the dull state of the market, with all the seeming activity, millmen and loggers are enabled to realize very small profits, even if they are able to come out whole at the end of the season. Wages in the camps vary from \$20 to \$80 per month. Last year they were from \$40 to \$135. > Published facts in relation to the revelations of the Pall Mall Gazette show a frightful state of affairs. The 'legal age" of women in England is fixed at 13, and taking advantage of this license to prey upon children, young girls have been entired and drugged by the paid tools of prominent men of London. One procuress confesses that a leading physician purchased from her an average of three young girls in two weeks, paying therefor from \$25 to \$35 each. The Gazette says that some of the houses in which young are lared have und.rg are and some country villas, which have thick walls, and are furnished with double carpets and heavily curtained windows, securely closed by thick shutters; and in one of these places a girl might scream blue murder, and her cries be unheard. One woman said that in her experience she found that drugged and ruined girls never knew what happened to them until the next morning. They would cry a good deal from pain, and a sense of their u miliation and reit. In 90 cases out of 100 the victims were usually girls under fifteen, and when they realized their position they would abandon hope and lead a life of shame thenceforth. A well-known member of parament laughed heartily when asked what he knew of surmised concerning the traffic in young girls. He said: "It is true that maids are obtained at so much a bead. I myself have procured a hundred at \$25 each. The girls knew what they were doing and it is nonsense to call it rape. They know their purity is a realizable

asset, and they are not slow to set a price upon it." Commissioner Sparks, in his anxiety to find under existing laws some rem-edy for the acknowledged fraudulent practices by pre-emption claimants, has ordered that the issue of all patents shall be suspended until each individual case can be investigated. His object is a good one, but this seems a harsh method of attaining it, as well as one of doubtful legality. It is questionable whether he has the power to withhold patents upon the presentation of proofs required by law, unless upon complaint and charges in the way specified by law. A COWARDLY MURDER.

The following particulars of a cow ardly murder are taken from the Baker City Sage Brush of July 9th: "Yesterday morning about half-past 2 o'clock, news reached this city that a foul murder had been committed last Tuesday morning, near the Malheur agency. The messenger reported that a man by the name of John Cooley had shot and killed James Layery a farmer and stock misses. Lavery, a farmer and stock raiser of that section. Immediately a warrant was issued by Justice Boynton and placed in the hands of Sheriff Dealy, who at once dispatched a deputy to the agency to serve the warrant. The particulars, as near as we can learn, are as follows: A dispute arose be-tween the two men as to who was the rightful owner of a piece of land they both claimed. Lavery claimed he had done everything required by law, had made final proof, and the land belonged to him, while Cooley main-tained that as he had a prior claim

he was the rightful owner.

On the morning of the 6th inst.

John Lavery, brother and partner of the deceased, in company with two hired men commenced cutting hay or the land. They had been at work but a few minutes when they were fired upon by a person concealed in the brush near by. The men thinking it dangerous to remain, immediately stopped work and returned home. On the following morning James Lavery, thinking there was no danger whatever, and considering the shooting of the previous day as a mere bluff, repaired to the field, and was about to commence work, when he was confronted by a 50-calibre needle gun in the hands of Cooley, who, lev-eling the gun at Lavery's heart, fired, the ball entering the left arm between the elbow and wrist, and thence passed through his heart.

The citizens of the surrounding country immediately after the killing turned out en masse to capture the murderer and found he had beer taken four miles north of the Malheur agency about 4 o'clock in the af ternoon by a young man named A.J. Whitley. When within a few yards of Cooly, Whitley leveled his gun and ordered him to throw up his hands, which order he obeyed, and was then taken by Whitley to the Baker City jail, reaching there at 11 o'clock the same night. The prisoner claims that he was on his way to

Baker City to give himself up.

The deceased was about 28 years of age. He was always considered a quiet and peaceful citizen and was highly respected by the people who knew him. He leaves a mother, sister and two brother to mourn his sudden and unexpected death. The re-mains were brought to Baker City Soiler Shop and baried.
